

PRICE SCHEDULE ON LEGUME SEED IS LIBERALIZED

A liberalized price schedule that will permit eligible county producers to sell all grades of winter legume seed to Commodity Credit was announced yesterday by the county AAA office. Growers interested should order cotton bags for sacking as there is a shortage and they may not be available later on, the AAA office announcement said. The new schedule provides a much wider range of grades than the 1941 program, and permits

the purchase of lower grades of seed that come within minimum requirements. Deductions for each one per cent that germination and purity tests fall below requirements for the top grade will give the farmer full value for his seed and eliminate the need for re-cleaning to make a specified grade, the county AAA office pointed out.

Prices for the top grades are the same as announced last fall, when many county growers signed agreements to sell at least half of their 1942 seed crops to the government.

From 1925 to 1940, approximately three-fifths of all new and used automobile sales, one-half of all sales of household appliances and two-fifths of furniture sales were made on an installment basis.

The church is offering a short course of Bible study for the primary, junior and intermediate departments of the Sunday school.

The school is giving a treat to the children on Monday at the close of the session and a beautiful picture of Christ for perfect attendance.

Riveter Sets Record With 1745 Punched in Then Goes to Dance

Portland, Ore., June 5.—(P)—Riveter Lloyd H. Laknes, 26, hammered 1745 rivets into the hull of a liberty freighter during a recent seven-and-a-quarter shift—and washed up and went to a dance.

The Oregon shipbuilding corporation, in announcing the feat today, claimed a national record for its tireless young champion. Laknes, corporation officers said, drove seven per cent of all rivets needed in a 10,000-ton freighter in a single shift.

Laknes himself was not greatly impressed and gave most of the credit to his seven-man crew. The boys kept the hot rivets coming at him one every 15 seconds.

Laknes, who learned to operate a rivet gun only last fall, was stirred to his record attempt by an Associated Press Wirephoto picture of a Los Angeles riveter whose count was 1456 for eight hours.

SUMMER SESSION TO OPEN AT SOCE

Southern Oregon College of Education Ashland, June 5.—(Spl.)—First summer session at the Southern Oregon College of Education will begin with registration at 8:15 a. m. Monday. Students planning to enroll for the first time will find that beginning courses are being offered. Advance students and candidates for the Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education will have a wide variety of choices in the field of education and liberal arts.

Of special interest to in-service teachers will be four demonstration classes conducted jointly by the college and the Lincoln Training School. These demonstration classes include the Integrated Unit, Beginning Reading, Preprimary Education, and Remedial Reading.

Out of state teachers will be able to get courses in Oregon History, Oregon School Law, and Oregon System of Education which are required by the state department for certification to teach in Oregon.
