

Giants Whip Cubs, 4-3 as Mel Ott Breaks Runs-Batted-in Record

HORNSBY FIGURE CRACKED BY LONG FLY TO OUTFIELD

Marshall's Homer Cinches Win — Cards Cop To Tighten Grip On Second

Mel Ott is likely to be remembered in baseball as the quietest record breaker on record.

Nobody gives it much thought any more, but every time the 33-year-old outfielder-manager of the New York Giants hits a homerun or draws a base on balls he breaks the all-time National league record—which he himself holds, of course.

Yesterday he achieved another goal—the runs batted in mark of 1,582 that Rogers Hornsby took 23 years to set while moving about among five different clubs—and Ott performed the deed in such a muffled way that it would not even have been noticed if people hadn't been waiting and watching for the last week.

With Bill Werber on third base in the third inning of a game at Chicago with the Cubs, Ott lofted a long fly to right and Werber scampered home with the run that brought Ott the record in his 17th season.

Now every time Ott drives in a tally for the rest of his National league career he will keep on setting a record and fans will think no more of it than they do his bases on balls and home run marks—unless he remains active long enough to get close to the record for both major league, 2,209 set by Babe Ruth during 22 years service in the American league.

Ott did not get a hit yesterday and his record-breaking feat was largely obscured by the exploit of a rookie teammate, Willard Marshall, who hammered his eighth home run of the season into the right field seats at Wrigley Field in the 11th inning to win the game 4-3.

The St. Louis Cardinals strengthened their hold on second place in the only other National league encounter by beating the Boston Braves 6-2. The veteran Lon Warneke was touched for ten hits, but kept constant control and the Redbirds wrapped up the decision with a five-run rally in the second inning.

In the American league the New York Yankees sent Edgar Smith, the unlucky southpaw, staggering to his ninth straight defeat with an 8-2 verdict over the Chicago White Sox.

Jimmy Foxx' Broken Ribs Mending Nicely; Chicago Fans Worried

Chicago, June 5.—(AP)—Jimmy Foxx has been spending the last three days answering questions about his now famous ribs. In fact, there hasn't been so much talk of ribs around here since a bar-b-que stand on the north side reduced its prices.

Like a broken record, Foxx goes along musing: "They still hurt."

"Ever since I got in town," he says, "everyone has been asking about my ribs—women and men in the stands, people on the street and kids on the corner."

"Maybe I'll be ready to play in a couple of days. The doc says the break mended nicely but that a cartilage had been torn. I don't get much pain when I swing a bit, but it's bad when I run."

The town's pretty interested in Foxx's ribs, figuring they cost about \$3,000 a pound, including that fracture and torn cartilage, caused when he was hit by a line drive while with the Boston Red Sox.

Baseball players have favorites, too, and Ott Double X, who has a lifetime big league batting mark of .332, certainly is the center of attraction for the Cubs' younger players.

The Spokane officials telegraphed the Western association last night asking that the entries be opened because of the cancellation of the National Publix tournament.

Today the reply from John Searle, Western Golf association secretary, said:

"All players not affiliated with clubs must have an accredited handicap rating of seven or better, or definite attested evidence of ability. They may apply for entry in the 1942 tournament subject to the approval of the tournament committee. Entries must be of the Caucasian race only."

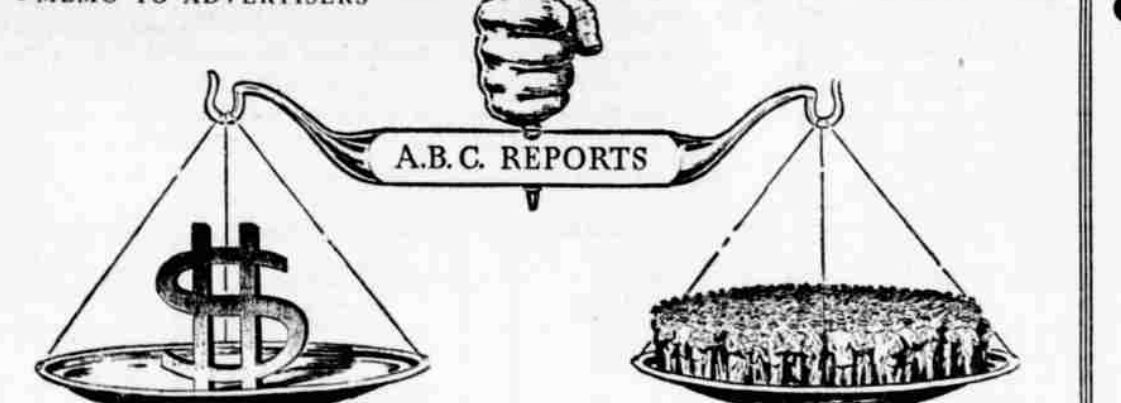
