

ROGERS RANCH IS SITE FOR ANNUAL GUERNSEY PICNIC

Business Men and Dairy Operators of Valley Attend Successful Affair.

Ginger Rogers' Rogue River Ranch, near Eagle Point, was the setting Thursday for the annual Guernsey day picnic, one of the most successful gatherings of its kind ever held by Guernsey fanciers of the Rogue River valley. Over 150 business men and dairy operators visited the modern dairy plant which is being developed on the film star's property, comprising over 1,000 acres.

Before lunch the visitors were shown through the Jamesway feed barns, the hay keeper as well as the milking parlor, milk room, refrigeration room and bottling room.

Picnic Lunch
A picnic lunch was served in the shade of the oak trees near the Rogers home, ice cream, coffee and Guernsey milk being furnished by members of the county association.

Ben King, president of the Jackson County Guernsey Breeders' association, introduced Charles A. Wing, president of the Oregon State Guernsey Breeders' association, who told of the work of the Guernsey breed in southern Oregon and of its very rapid growth and popularity in the state at large.

R. G. Fowler, county agent, spoke on the dairy industry in southern Oregon and its future here.

C. A. Smith, field representative of the American Guernsey Cattle club, who came to Medford to attend the picnic, also addressed the group advising that the state association had a larger membership than the state of California and that such institutions as the Rogers dairy were indeed a credit to the breed. Others giving short addresses were Eugene Thorndike of the First National bank and Lela Rogers, mother of the star, who is managing the great ranch.

Among others attending the picnic were E. F. Calhoun, treasurer of the State Guernsey Breeders' association, of Grants Pass, Melvin H. King, vice president of the State association, Ben Nelson and Judge Johnson, prominent Guernsey breeders of Grants Pass, Charles Austin, Medford city milk inspector, and Frank Rowe of the Oregon Milk Control board.

After the picnic lunch all were taken to see the fine new group of registered Guernseys recently purchased by Mrs. Rogers, pedigrees having been given by C. A. Smith of the American Guernsey Cattle club. Movies were taken of the group, buildings and cattle by the American Guernsey Cattle club.

JIM FARLEY EATS LUNCH WITH FDR.

Washington, June 6.—(AP)—James A. Farley, former postmaster general, met with President Roosevelt today for the first time in months and said afterward that he was "satisfied that there will be no difficulty so far as the gubernatorial nominee in New York state is concerned and the Democratic nominee will be the next governor."

Farley emerged from the White House after an hour-and-a-half luncheon conversation in good humor but generally non-committal. He volunteered that "I had a very nice chat about a lot of things that there is no news in."

Asked about New York politics, he said that as state Democratic chairman, he believed it would not be wise for him to discuss individual candidacies, adding that the convention would choose the nominees.

Governor Herbert Lehman has announced he would not accept a nomination for another term.

SEEK GUARANTEE NO MORE HITLERS AFTER THIS WAR

Bronxville, N. Y., June 6.—(AP)—Eugene Meyer, publisher of the Washington Post, said today that after the war the United States must "see to it that no future Hitler can arise, either in Germany or elsewhere."

"We, as a nation, must either play a part in world affairs that is commensurate with our wealth and strength and resources, or else cede to others the power and position that rightly belongs to us," he said in an address prepared for graduation exercises at Sarah Lawrence college.

"Victory, in itself, does not mean peace. It can only mean the creation of a state of affairs in which peace can be achieved and maintained."

"Hitler may have his successors, unless, once we have achieved victory, we see to it that no future Hitler can arise, either in Germany or elsewhere. And that means the cooperative effort of peace-loving nations, including the United States."

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S. W. HUTCHINSON PASSES, AGED 75, AT TRAIN HOME

Samuel William Hutchinson, 75, passed away early June 6, 1942, at his home near Trail.

Sam Hutchinson, as he was known to his friends, was born in Wayne County, Iowa, January 27, 1867, third child of eight born to William M., and Mary Pauline Hutchinson. At the age of four years his parents moved to Clay Center, Clay County, Kansas, where they located on a homestead. When Sam was 15 years of age he moved with his parents to Bradford, Pa., where he grew to young manhood.

With an older brother, Ephraim Hutchinson, and family, he came to Portland, Ore., in 1888. The following year he joined his parents at Tacoma, Wash. Soon afterward he went to Garfield County, Washington, where he became a wheat farmer. At Pomeroy, Wash., he was united in marriage with Jennie May Fitzsimmons on October 28, 1894. To this union two sons were born, Floyd L., of Molalla, Ore., and Keva E., of Klamath Falls, Ore.

In the fall of 1917, the Hutchinson family came to Jackson County where Mr. and Mrs. Hutchinson have since made their home on the Rogue river near Trail.

Mr. Hutchinson loved life and his joy was complete when friends filled the shady yard in summertime or clustered 'round the blazing fireplace in winter. He was a lover of nature and looked forward each year to fishing trips to Diamond lake and other places where fish abound.

He leaves to mourn his passing, his wife at the family home, two sons, eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren, two brothers, Glenn C. Hutchinson of Bradford, Pa., and H. R. Hutchinson of Portland, Ore., and two sisters, Mrs. Mary Thompson of Bradford, Pa., Mrs. Gertrude Smith of Los Angeles, Cal., and a host of friends.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Perl funeral home Monday at 10:30 a. m. Interment will take place in Siskiyou Memorial park.

LOCAL MAN'S SON NIPS' PRISONER

Lorne B. Cox, son of John Cox, of 515 West Jackson street, who enlisted in the army here about six months ago, was at Corregidor when the United States forces surrendered to the Japanese there, and must be considered a captive of the invaders, the father has been informed by the office of the Adjutant General, in Washington, D. C.

The father said Saturday that his son had been employed for about ten years as a baker in Chilquin, Ore., since graduating from high school here. About six months ago he came here to visit his father and at that time decided to enlist in the army. He was sent at once to San Francisco and from there was transported to the Philippine Islands, where he was serving as a baker for the combat forces when they were overpowered by sheer weight of numbers, May 7.

The father received a Christmas card after the son arrived in the islands but has not heard directly from him since.

FOOD PRESERVING MEETINGS SLATED FOR COMING WEEK

To help women of Jackson County use to the best advantage foods grown in their Victory Gardens, demonstrations on the preservation of food will be held throughout the county beginning June 8, according to Miss Marian J. Farrell, home demonstration agent.

Miss Farrell quotes Lou Richardson, of the ninth corps civilian defense area as pointing out that the homemaker's first job in defense of her country is "to start at home," and "Save! Save! Save! We can do our part then by insuring that our homes will have an adequate supply of nutritious foods for next winter. This will save commercial products for the armed forces, and save surpluses of summer garden produce."

The United States Department of Agriculture recommends that individuals plan to dry more foods this year. For the drying of fruits and vegetables that mature late in the season, Miss Farrell will give instruction on construction of simple homemade evaporators. Freezing is one of the most satisfactory methods of preservation for those living near storage lockers and is an excellent means of conserving the sugar supply.

The Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer star arrived from a brief stay in Ashland at 2:15 p. m. and was met at the south city limits by a Boy Scout color guard, soldiers from the armory, army vehicles, the junior high school drum and bugle corps, a 13-ton tank and other equipment.

Upon reaching the city center Tarzan Jr., rode from booth to booth in an army jeep and sold stamps until 4:30 with hundreds of eager youngsters crowding about to buy stamps and secure his autograph.

The busy day was concluded with a patriotic rally at the Victory Center at 7:30 where music was furnished by Mrs. Alexander's string orchestra, and personal appearances at the Craterian and Holly theaters which were crowded to the rafters.

Included in the group accompanying the little actor are his mother, Mrs. Reginald Sheffield, F. H. Clark, his personal manager and Captain Volney Phifer, in charge. Soldiers driving the 13-ton tank which is making the tour, are Staff Sergeant E. R. Farrand, Sergeant P. F. Parnest and Private Roy Olsen.

FLYING CROSS TO OREGONIAN HERO IN PHILIPPINES

Jacksonville, Fla., June 6.—(AP)—Lieut. (J. G.) Elwyn L. Christman of Mt. Angel, Ore., was awarded the navy flying cross today for "extraordinary heroism" while commanding an attacking patrol bomber against a Japanese naval force off the Philippines, Dec. 27.

The award was made by Capt. John D. Price, station instructor at the Jacksonville naval air station, declared the bombing attack was against "a cruiser, destroyers and transport at Jolo, Sulu, P. I."

"The bombing attack met accurate anti-aircraft and fighter opposition," the citation said. "With the leader of the formation missing, in the face of overwhelming odds, you dived your patrol plane at the enemy vessels and released your bombs with resultant damage to those vessels."

"Thereafter, your plane having been set afire by enemy fighter attacks, you successfully landed your plane off the coast of Jolo island and subsequently led the surviving members of the crew of your plane to the U. S. naval headquarters, Surabaya, Java, N. E. I. During the attack your gunners shot down one enemy fighter."
