PORTLAND RENTS ORDERED FROZEN AS OF MARCH 1

Portland, June 6—(P)—The Portland City Council today passed an ordinance, effective June 30, freezing rents as of March 1 in keeping with an OPA order issued several weeks ago.

Mayor Earl Riley urged the action to keep local affairs in the hands of the city government.

He told the council that the city will be allowed to control rents here so long as its administration is approved by the federal government.

If the city does not achieve desired results, federal officials will step in, he warned.

Harold Rogers, representing the Oregon Apartment House Association, termed the freeze "A bitter pill to swallow" but promised "wholehearted support."

Oregon OPA Director Richard G. Montgomery praised passage of the ordinance. "We hope control can be accomplished by local effort," he said.
