"Future of World" Topic of Rev. Fife At Central Avenue

The largest audience of the Central Avenue Church of Christ, corner Central Avenue and Jackson street heard Evangelist Earl Hanson Fife last night in an address on Armageddon. He began with interesting archaeological discoveries made on the plains of Megiddo, the most natural battle ground in the world, where the Canaanites, Philistines, Egyptians, Chaldeans, Persians, Greeks, Romans, Moslems, Jews and Christians have their decisive struggles. Tonight he will give the concluding prophetic message on the theme "The Future of the World and the Hope of the Church." After Sunday night, Mr. Fife will continue the revival with a different line of sermons, opening next week with the theme "If I Had Only One More Week to Live What Would I Do With It?" He will teach the model adult Bible class at 9:45 this morning. At 10:45 a. m. his sermon theme will be "The Glory of the Church in an Hour Like This."

PAPAL SUMMER PLANS

Berlin (From German Broadcasts), June 6.—(AP)—One German radio said today that Pope Pius XII had decided for the third year of the war to forego his summer stay at Castel Gandolfo and would remain at the Vatican. It said Vatican vacations had been shortened at his request.

MAY IN CHARGE STATE RATIONING WHEN FIVE QUIT

Portland, June 6.—(AP)—Walter W. R. May, Portland, took charge of organizing Oregon rationing today after five resignations that caused Governor Sprague to charge that working conditions in the state rationing administration "are no longer agreeable."

May was appointed by Richard G. Montgomery, who became director when the OPA recently took over rationing duties.

May will supervise the setting up of 58 price and rationing boards planned by the OPA.

Those who resigned were O. L. Price, state rationing executive and former state director; Albert L. Shellworth, Price's assistant; W. S. Dirker, state sugar rationing administrator, and O. L. McPherson, Multnomah sugar rationing chief.

Price blamed personal business reasons for the resignation. The others did not comment.

The governor said, "I have not talked personally to the men, but I am sure that changed working conditions caused them personally to desire not to continue." He did not amplify.

CAROLINA YOUTHS SHUN EDUCATION TO AVOID DRAFT

Raleigh, N. C., June 6.—(AP)—J. E. Miller, director of the state adult education department, said today that adult education classes for draftees rejected because of illiteracy had failed in North Carolina.

"The draftees prefer to dodge the draft rather than to learn to read and write," he said. "The illiterate youth who is eager to learn that he might serve his country is an unusual case."

Miller said that 23 school units in North Carolina have organized classes to teach illiterate draftees but that the rejected men were "a little too wise to go to a school which will prepare them to get back into the army."

The classes, Miller said, were abandoned.

3. Primary children, six to eight years, Miss Mabel Jewett, superintendent, will guide in a consideration of "Our Church."
4. The juniors, nine to 12 years, will learn about "Our Community" under direction of Oletha Olson.
5. The intermediates or junior high school, will consider "The Living Church," under guidance of R. W. Coleman.

Interesting projects are being planned in connection with each course and the superintendents will be assisted by several helpers in each department. Eunice Smith is the general superintendent and Georgia Burnham assistant superintendent.

Any boy or girl in the community is eligible to enroll.
