

SPRING CAMPOREE FOR BOY SCOUTS DURING WEEK-END

Medford Troops 3 and 4
Take Honors in Outdoor
Event—Feature Cooking.

Troops 3 and 4 of Medford took top honors at the annual Boy Scout spring camporee held at the Elk's picnic grounds Saturday and Sunday. Sixty scouts and their leaders took part in the two-day camping affair and competed in numerous events including camp making, cooking, first aid, fire building, rope work, signaling, nature study, etc. Ratings as "Proficient" camporee troops were presented to troops 3 and 4 at the close by J. A. McDougall, district commissioner.

Troops 8 of Medford and 17 of Gold Hill were next in line and received "Standard" ratings. Troops 5 and 7 of Medford each earned "Participating" awards.

Fewer Attend
The camp commenced Saturday morning as the troops marched into the grounds fully loaded and made their own overnight camp. Due to older boys having jobs and to transportation difficulties the number of scouts participating was smaller than a year ago, but in the judgement of scout officials present the quality of the work was far about that demonstrated in 1941. Particularly outstanding, according to McDougall, was the cooking. Troops 3 and 4 both cooked their Saturday evening meal "emu fashion." It was all prepared in the ground without the use of utensils. Troop 4 served baked chicken, potatoes, carrots, apples, and nut bread all cooked in an emu hole. Troop 3 did a similar job and turned out a delicious roast of beef with potatoes and carrots.

A non-sectarian church service Sunday morning and the award of ribbons brought the camporee to a close about 11:30 a. m.

Washington, June 8.—(AP)—Brian Bell, chief of the Washington bureau of the Associated Press and known by newspapermen from coast to coast, died at his Arlington, Va., home this morning at 5:40.

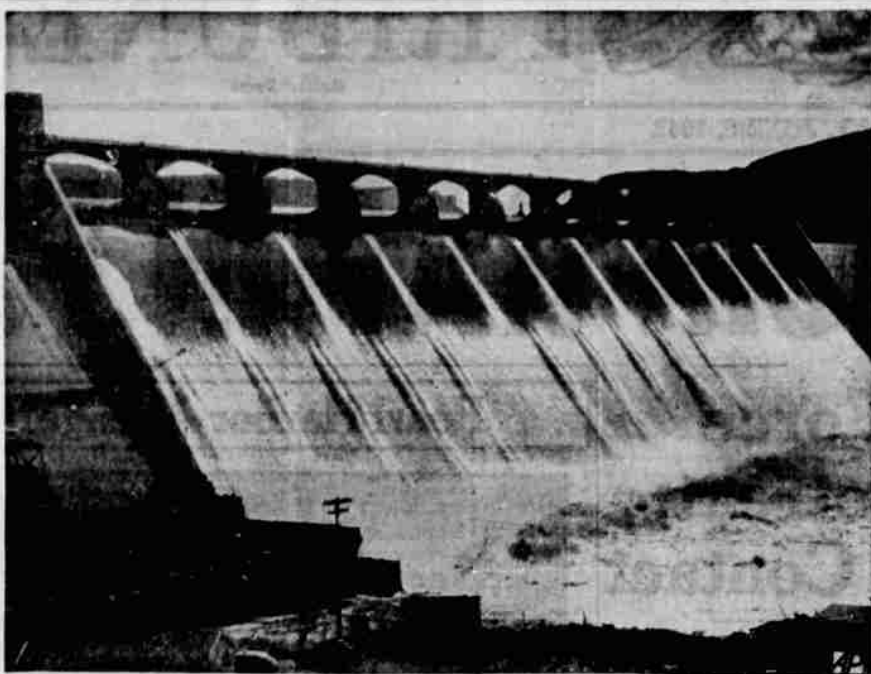
The 52-year-old native of South Carolina had headed the Washington office of the Associated Press since January 1, 1939, after serving in Atlanta, Ga., New Orleans, New York, Los Angeles and San Francisco. Widely-known a few years ago as a sports writer, Bell was stricken yesterday as he watched the Washington-Detroit baseball game. His physician said he suffered an acute coronary thrombosis at the ball park. A second this morning at 5:40 proved fatal.

MEDFORD PILOTS OFFERED CHANCE TO TEACH FLYING

The army air forces plan to employ 2,000 civilian pilots within the next 60 days for non-combat pilot duty. The tremendous expansion program of the army air forces cannot be accomplished unless the services of every qualified civilian pilot are utilized.

A board of officers under command of Colonel George E. Henry from the west coast air force training center will be in Medford at the municipal airport June 3 to interview and examine interested civilian pilots.

The examination will consist of an explanatory interview, a physical examination, and a flight check.

Every civilian pilot who is able to meet the requirements is invited to contact the board upon its arrival at the Medford airport.

The applicants who can qualify will be given temporary civil service ratings as "trainee instructor" for a period of three to six months at a salary of \$300 per month while undergoing a special instructors' training course at one of the W. C. A. F. T. C. flying schools.

Applicants must have reached their 21st but not their 42nd birthday, be American citizens of unquestioned loyalty, have excellent character, and be able to pass the physical examination required for service pilots.

Applicants must possess a currently effective CAA commercial pilots' certificate or have equivalent airplane pilot experience as evidenced by certified log books and ratings formerly held. Applicants should bring with them a certified copy of birth certificate, three letters of character recommendation, and all records pertaining to flying experience, including the aforementioned airmen certificates and certified log books.

Aid for Small Mines Under New RFC Rule

Washington, June 8.—(AP)—Small mines will be able to operate with the aid of a new reconstruction finance corporation rule, Senator Murray (D-Mont.) said Saturday.

He said the rule provides loans up to \$5,000 for preliminary mine work in instances in which the RFC believes the expenditure would "reveal sufficient mineral showings to make a development mining loan."
