Corbett, Sockeye Clash in Main Go

PAIR FIGURED TO
STAGE BRUISING
BATTLE TONIGHT

Belcastro and Craig Grapple
in Middle Event—Chief
and Newcomer in Opener.

Big Joe Corbett, the Australian powerhouse, and Sockeye Jack McDonald, the Vancouver shipbuilder and wrestler-wrecker, come together in the one-hour main event of tonight's armory grapple program starting at 8:30 sharp with a four-round opener pitting Chief Thunderbird against Cliff Olson of Wisconsin, a scientific newcomer.

Appearing in the middle event, slated for two 10-minute rounds or the best two out of three falls, will be Pete Belcastro, the Weed villain, and George Craig, the Camp White blacksmith-wrestler, who, surprisingly, took the measure of Cowboy Dude Chick on last week's card.

The ring foundations are expected to be strained to the utmost when Corbett and McDonald, two of the strongest men in the industry, do their main-event stint. Although Corbett likes to wrestle in a legitimate fashion as long as possible, he is not above employing elbows and knees where they will hurt most, if his opponent desires this sort of activity. McDonald is something of the same type, grappling fairly so long as his enemy of the evening duplicates the procedure.

However, as fireworks are apt to break out when one or the other forgets himself and passes over the line separating the legitimate from the villainous. This may happen at any time before the 60 minutes are up, thus winding up the match then and there.

With a fine start last Monday night, which marked his first appearance here in some six years, Craig will be out to make it two in a row and elevate himself to main event status. Belcastro, as usual, will have something to say on this score, and the manner in which he will say it can be well imagined by everybody who has watched the Weed wildcat in action.

Startling was the sudden stirring of the Pacific Coast league's last place Portland Beavers this weekend, which cost San Diego three defeats and dropped the strong Padre club at least temporarily out of first place contention.

Late inning splurges clinched victory for Portland in the two Sunday games, 6 to 2 and 5 to 3. In the seventh frame of the opener Marty Martinez and Pitcher Joe Orrell followed up a struck batsman and an error with a single and a double. All that produced three runs, and Lee Stine's fly with the bases loaded brought home another in the next scene.

The nextcap, a six-hit victory for the veteran Wayne Osborne whom Portland acquired from Hollywood a week ago, was decided in the last change seventh inning on four hits and two walks off three Padre pitchers, good for four runs. Saturday's play resulted in an 8-5 Portland victory.

If Sacramento had continued to enjoy the same combination of pitching and hitting it received in yesterday's first game, the Senators by today would have overtaken Los Angeles in the struggle for the league lead.

In that opener Blix Donnelly tossed a six-hitter, the Sacs came through with three blows and a run in the chips down ninth inning, and Seattle fell, 3-2.

In the second game, however, the Rainiers, winning 6-3, pounded Bill Schmidt for 10 hits and Herschel Lyons for four more over the seven-inning stretch.
