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Jap Striking Power Seriously Crippled By Loss At Midway

The beaten and badly wounded Jap fleet seems to have hidden itself from pursuit in the vastness of the Pacific and to be slinking home from its rash adventure at our Midway base, but we have the satisfaction of knowing that while the enemy hasn't suffered an overwhelming defeat his striking-power has been very considerably lessened.

We may never learn the full extent of the damage our forces inflicted on the Nipponese at Midway, but at least three enemy warships were sunk and 11 more heavily damaged and virtually the whole accompanying air force was destroyed. Our announced losses were one destroyer sunk, an airplane carrier damaged and some planes destroyed.

68 Warships Lost Since Pearl Harbor

That brings estimated Japanese naval losses since Pearl Harbor up to 68 warships sunk and 71 damaged. This is apart from a large number of second-rate vessels and 146 transports sunk or damaged.

You begin to get an idea of how badly this hurts when you consider that the estimated strength of the Mikado's navy at the outset of the war was in the neighborhood of 265 ships. The 68 sunk would be more than a quarter of this total, and if you add the 71 craft damaged you have more than half. These unofficial estimates don't take into account any ships which may have been commissioned since the war began.

Now these losses are particularly serious for Japan because of her dependence on her navy not only to wage offensive war but to protect her ill-gotten conquests. Her whole future hangs on her control of the western Pacific.

That brings us to another point which has been discussed previously in this column but is worth emphasizing. I believe that since the conquest of Indonesia the Japs have been primarily concerned with protecting and consolidating their gains. That is to say, apart from their determination to knock out the Chinese, they had bitten off all they could chew and wanted to get ahead with the mastication.

Operations Now Of Defensive Nature

This means that the Japanese operations now, except for the Chinese, theater, are largely defensive. The essential reason for the attack on Midway was to secure a strong point which would hamper our activities in the western Pacific and render our Australian base impotent by cutting the supply lines. Of course, the Japs would be prepared to exploit any weakness uncovered, but this doesn't alter the fundamental strategy of defense.

This doesn't mean that the Nipponese are going to sit down and wait for attack. The Russians have demonstrated in an unforgettable manner that offense frequently is the best form of defense, and we may expect the Japs to be on the move. Apart from other considerations, Hitler undoubtedly is urging his allies to strike now as a measure of cooperation with the offensive which he himself is preparing to launch.

Further assaults on American possessions may be expected. The Japanese may try to raid our western seaboard. Circumstances may even impel them to attack Russia, and it would be surprising if there weren't further blows at Australia's northern coast and the east coast of India.

THE CHILD DOESN'T WANT TO DO WRONG

Altogether too many letters run something like this:

"What can be done to break a child of the bed-wetting habit? The child is seven years old and no amount of shame or punishment seems to do any good."

Such a letter makes me wish I could give the parent or guardian of the unhappy child a nice confidential, strictly private kick in the pants.

Censure, shame or punishment of a child for wetting the bed is as futile as it is wicked. No child willfully does so. Neither is it an indication of any kind of inferiority in the make-up or mentality or disposition of the child.

It is more or less normal for children to continue this infantile habit, at least at times, up to the age of three years. That is, there is nothing to be concerned about if a child occasionally does so up to that age.

Instead of the despicable practice of humiliating the child by speaking of the matter in the presence of other persons, as ignorant or vicious parents or guardians sometimes do, keep it secret between you and the child, as far as possible, and share sincerely the child's natural regret when the accident happens and pleasure when it doesn't. Thus you gain the child's confidence and cooperation in a systematic plan or schedule which will correct the habit—this is described in the pamphlet on Bed-wetting.

Generally bed-wetting is a manifestation of neuro-muscular fatigue or irritability and hence an indication of calcium deficiency. To this end two items in the diet described in the pamphlet are especially important—eggs or egg yolk and cheese.

When I say cheese, I mean natural cheese, unadorned cheese, genuine cheese, real cheese and not these blanketed concoctions made by grinding up a little cheese of any kind available with dried milk, milk sugar, a dab of butter or whatever odds and ends happen to be cheap enough.

The only items to be excluded from the diet of a bed-wetting

child are tea, coffee, cocoa, highly seasoned foods, sweets (except as dessert after the main meal of the day), condiments, hot sauces. The child should have all the water he or she wants to drink, except in some cases after the evening meal.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Raw Milk

Our children have never had raw milk and I think they should. We will soon spend two months in the country, and a farm where the cows are apparently well cared for, has raw milk. Is it all right for the children? (M. M. C.)

Answer—The only raw milk I can recommend is Certified Milk or Grade A Raw from tuberculin tested, Bang-tested herd.

Natural Vitamin A for High Blood Pressure

I might have passed the examination for flying service, but they found my blood pressure 164 and told me to return for a recheck. Otherwise everything was normal. I am strong and I believe perfectly well, but I always get "buck fever" upon encountering a doctor. (L. E. H.)

Answer—Try taking one grain of quinine, in pill, tablet or capsule, after food, three times a day, for a week or ten days before the examination. In some cases of essential hypertension (high blood pressure without demonstrable cause) excellent results are obtained from massive doses of natural vitamin A (not carotene)—100,000 to 150,000 units daily.
