

JACKSON COUNTY BOND BUYING HAS BOMBER AS GOAL

Sum Equivalent to Cost of
4-Motored Plane, \$250,-
000, Is Sought For June.

Alm of Jackson county residents for the month of June is purchase a four-motored bomber to be presented to the U. S. government for use on the war front, W. A. Gates county chairman of the war bond sales announced today. Here is an opportunity, Mr. Gates stated, for every Jackson county man, woman and child to feel that they are actually participating in this struggle. "If you own a share in the bomber, you are at the fighting front," he explained.

"We can do it," he said, explaining that the cost of the bomber would be \$250,000. "There are many of us," he continued, "unable to personally engage in the struggle on the front line in this second fight for peace. Therefore, in order to feel that we, ourselves are individually present in the battle, we can present the U. S. government with a bomber, 'our bomber'."

Sale to Speed Up
It is anticipated by the county war bond committee that the sale of bonds and stamps will be stepped up during the coming month to reach the goal of \$250,000.

Looking forward to the purchase of a warplane it is hoped that Jackson county residents will "purchase just a little more" than their monthly share in order that this bomber purchase can be realized.

Mr. Gates repeated that wholehearted support of every American citizen in the county can bring about the realization of this project and that every bond and stamp will buy a share in the bomber as Jackson county's June contribution to the present crisis.

Boston, Mass., June 9—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—The great task now confronting a liberated America, which more than three quarters of a century ago fought a four-years war to free the slaves, is to aid in working out the freedom of the whole world from slavery. The Christian Science board of directors told several thousand Christian Scientists gathered in annual meeting in Boston today.

The directors also announced the election of Mrs. Elisabeth F. Norwood of Brookline, Mass., as president of The Mother Church for the ensuing year. The chief duty of the president is to preside at the annual meeting.

The report of the treasurer for the fiscal year ending April 30, 1942, showed that the finances of The Mother Church were in sound condition, that aside from current bills and accrued taxes there was no indebtedness.
