

INQUEST TONIGHT FOR VICTIMS OF SISKIYOU CRASH

Bodies Mangled
The three bodies were mangled beyond recognition and were in a high state of decomposition. One was directly under what was left of the plane and the other two were found about 80 and 90 feet distant. The bodies were brought to the coroner's.

Captain Staats estimated the scene of the crash as being about four miles from the Pacific Highway, and said it took the investigating party an hour and 50 minutes to reach the wrecked plane and four hours to bring the bodies back to the highway for removal to Medford.

Included in the investigating party, along with Captain Staats, were Carlos W. Morris, deputy coroner; Master Sergeant Willie Daws and Sergeant Ray Garcia and Owen Davis of the army air corps here and a detail of officers and men from the post quarter-master's unit stationed in the army.

From Felts Field
The plane, according to an Associated Press report, left Felts field in Spokane, Wash., last January 6 on a mission south, and was not heard from after reporting by radio to Medford at 10:53 a.m. on that date.

After its failure to arrive at its destination an aerial search was carried on throughout northern California for several days, the search centering in the Fort Jones area where it had been reported seen. The search was finally called off when no trace of the plane could be found.

Soon after the crash a heavy snow fell in the Siskiyou, apparently hiding the wreckage from the aerial searching parties and ground crews looking for the craft, and there it remained until discovered by Miller and Hoadley.

Lieutenant Stockwell, whose home was in Spokane, was one of the best-known photographic pilots in the army air force. He had flown this course for a number of years and had many friends here.

According to the A. P. dispatch from Spokane Sgt. Randolph Jones' father lives in Joplin, Mo., and Sgt. Paul W. Stone's father resides in Bayside, Tex.

**PACIFIST NABBED
HERE IN MARCH**

Fred William Barfoot, 35, of the Lake hotel of this city, who pleaded innocent before Federal Judge James Alger Fee in Portland yesterday to an indictment charging failure to file his selective service questionnaire and failure to keep his draft board notified of his whereabouts, was arrested here by state police March 6, and after appearing before U. S. Commissioner Victor A. Tengwald was placed in the county jail to await indictment proceedings.

Barfoot, a meatcutter by trade but doing orchard work at the time of his arrest, registered for the selective service at Bonanza, Ore. The Associated Press reported that Barfoot once wrote his draft board, "I am resigning my citizenship, don't bother me with any more draft paper," and another time, "I refuse to support this unconstitutional government."

CAMP EMPLOYEES HURT IN SMASHUP

Johnson and Hugh Anderson, Camp White employees residing at Eagle Point, received medical treatment at Community hospital last night after the automobile in which they were riding collided with a gravel dump truck operated by Lloyd Delbert Arons of route 4, box 355. The accident occurred about 10:02 p.m., at the intersection of the Central Point-Four Corners road and Hamrick road, state police reported today.

Arons, also a Camp White worker, was driving east on the Central Point road, and Johnson, driver of a coupe was proceeding west. Both machines were damaged considerably. State police said, the rear end of the dump truck being knocked out of the truck chassis.

The attending physician said today that Johnson received bruises and was still in the hospital. Anderson received a cut on the back of his head and was released after stitches had been taken in the wound. Arons was not injured.

PETAINE IS CONVINCED AXIS CANNOT WIN WAR

Washington, June 10.—(AP)—Two years of war since Dunkerque have convinced Chief of State Marshal Petain that the axis cannot win, authoritative reports from Vichy revealed today.

There was a time after the fall of France in 1940 when Petain regarded a German victory as inevitable; but now, these reports said, the old marshal is convinced Germany and her allies will be defeated.

Vichy's collaborationist chief of government Pierre Laval, however, still holds the contrary view.
