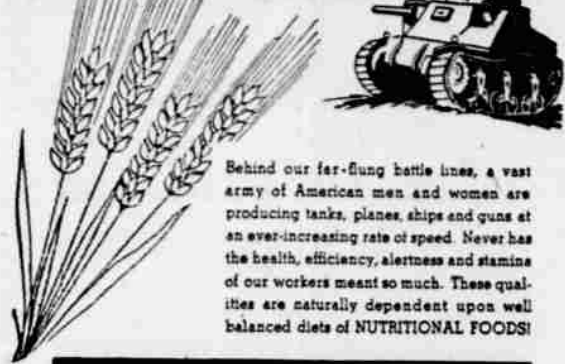


COAST NAVAL ACADEMY

Rogue River Dairy Herd
Improvement Report

The monthly report of the Dairy Herd Improvement association for May has been completed and shows the number of herds on test as 29, number of cows as 750. Twenty-eight cows were culled out during the month for various reasons including Bangs disease reactors, sale for dairy purposes and low production.

Records of cows which have completed lactation periods of 305 days during the month show that E. B. Poyer of Ashland has six cows with a top of 551 pounds of fat and the lowest 332 pounds of fat for a two-year old. Others making high records were owned by Mike Heckenberger, Eagle Point; Chester Wendt, Medford; C. R. Natwick, Eagle Point; L. H. Gallatin and Charles Axel of Ashland.

Shipment of Legume
Seed Crop Slated

Jackson county has nearly 2,000 acres of vetch seed of different varieties signed up for shipment to the southern states. In order to relieve congestion in warehouses, the State A.A.A. of-

fice has announced that seed will be shipped on purity test alone but that germination tests will have to be completed later to obtain complete payment.

Farmers whose seed is shipped under this plan will be paid 80 per cent of the price for the top germination of the grade, as indicated by the official purity test. Additional amounts due will be paid as soon as the official germination test is received.

Fire Prevention Is
Season's Watchword

Prevention rather than cure will be the biggest factor in cutting down Oregon farm and rural fire loss. This year especially care must be taken to safeguard buildings from fire, both by taking due precaution inside the buildings and around houses and barn lots.

Organization plans for rural fire fighting are now under way in cooperation with the State Fire Patrol for rural fire protection. According to Art King, extension specialist, Oregon State college, nearly one-third of all fires in farm buildings start from stoves or chimneys. While most of these fires occur during the winter, greatest damage is done by such fires in summer. About one-fifth of all farm dwelling fires are caused by sparks lighting on roofs and in most cases are helped by dry moss or old shingles.

We have had some bad fires in hay during the past few years, mostly caused by too much moisture in the hay. Storing hay before it is dry or from rain leaking through a barn roof on stored hay will cause heating and spontaneous ignition. If, because of a wet season such as this is, proper curing and drying of hay is difficult, it is safer to stack such hay in the field than to take chances by putting it in the barn.

Baltimore, June 11.—(AP)—King George II of Greece, arriving here today on a Pan American Clipper plane, said his country was "in the war to stay" and that he would go to Washington to arrange Lease-Lend shipments of war supplies direct to great fighting forces. "The Greek army, its air corps and more than half of its original navy are fighting today in many theaters of the war," the exiled king declared.

SLIGHT INCREASE
IN WINTER WHEAT
CROP, IS OUTLOOK

Oats Production Over Last Year—Pear Crop Will Be Less Than Last Season.

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—The Agriculture department today forecast the winter wheat crop at 646,831,000 bushels and the spring wheat crop at 221,128,000 bushels, based on June 1 conditions.

The winter wheat forecast compared with 646,875,000 bushels indicated a month ago, 671,293,000 bushels produced last year, and 569,417,000 bushels, the average for the years 1930-39.

The spring wheat forecast was the first official announcement of the season and compared with 274,644,000 bushels produced last year, and a 10-year average production of 178,090,000 bushels.

Indicated production of rye is 34,397,000 bushels, compared with 53,279,000 bushels indicated a month ago, 45,191,000 bushels produced last year, and 38,472,000 bushels, the 10-year average.

Oats production this year is indicated as 1,232,380,000 bushels, compared with 1,176,107,000 bushels last year, and a 10-year average of 1,007,141,000 bushels.

The barley crop is indicated as 401,843,000 bushels, compared with 358,709,000 bushels last year, and 224,970,000 bushels, the 10-year average.

Peach production is indicated as 67,418,000 bushels, compared with 74,170,000 last year, and a 10-year average of 34,706,000 bushels.

Pear Crop Dips
Indicated production of pears is 29,503,000 bushels, compared with 29,533,000 last year, and 27,253,000, the 10-year average production.

The condition of certain crops on June 1 was reported as follows:

All spring wheat 89 per cent of a normal, compared with 87 a year ago, and 74, the June 1 1940 average.

Oats, 85, compared with 82 and 77.

Barley, 84, compared with 83 and 77.

Hay (all tame), 86, compared with 75 and 76.

Pasture, 88, compared with 79 and 76.

Apples (commercial crop), 68, compared with 65 and 84.

Peaches, 69, compared with 75 and 62.

Pears, 69, compared with 87 and 63.

GRANGERS FAVOR
BONE POWER BILL

Wenatchee, Wash., June 11.—(AP)—Unanimous approval of a resolution favoring Senator Homer T. Bone's Columbia power administration bill was given today by the 1,600 Grangers at the 53rd annual state session here.

E. F. Taylor of Coeur D'Alene, master of the Idaho State Grange, said "The Grange today stands at the peak of its influence, and Grangers face the greatest problem ever confronting farm people."

He condemned rules that make it necessary for farmers to hire union men to drive their

trucks in delivering produce in cities, and urged delegates to "get their backs up and fight." That's what Idaho is doing, even though the supreme court has upheld this thing, he said.

NOTICE TO WATER USERS

The Medford Water Commission request the cooperation of all water users in complying with the following rules and regulations.

TURN OFF IN CASE OF FIRE:

All consumers of water shall close all faucets and fixtures immediately upon the sounding of a fire alarm. The water shall not be turned on again until the Fire Department has ceased to use the water supply to extinguish the fire. The Fire Department will indicate with the alarm when they have ceased to use the water.

OPEN HOSE NOT ALLOWED:

The use of an open hose in watering is prohibited, nor shall a nozzle used in sprinkling be larger than 1/4" in diameter.

WASTE NOT ALLOWED:

Water allowed to run waste down sidewalks, streets or gutters as a result of sprinkling of lawn, gardens, or park strips is prohibited. When any such waste is discovered the water shall be shut off from the premises.

LAWN SPRINKLING SYSTEMS:

A lawn or garden sprinkling system shall be constructed and operated so not more than twenty (20) gallons of water per minute shall be used in any circuit or battery of sprinkling heads. Not more than one circuit shall be operated at one time. Each circuit shall have a control valve readily accessible to the Water Department Inspector.

AIR RAID PRECAUTIONS

TURN OFF ALL WATER:

Stop all use of water at the sounding of an air raid alarm. In the event of an attack or bombing do not use the water supply for anything except essential purposes until notice from the Water Commission. This notice will be given by radio and newspaper.

DO NOT FILL TUBS DURING ALARM:

Keep your reservoir for fire fighting water full at all times. Do not attempt to fill bath tubs or reservoirs on the sounding of an air raid alarm or during an air raid.

These rules and regulations are mandatory and any violation subjects the offender to a fine or discontinuance of service.
