FOUR-BAGGER IS ONLY BLOW MADE BY THIRD SACKER

Wayne Osborne Gets Credit For 5-4 Victory—Rainiers Blank S. F. Seals, 5-0.

Hank Martinez, Portland third sacker, was a star player of Pacific Coast league baseball last night although he did nothing exceptional on the hot corner and got but one hit in seven attempts.

But that one hit was a homer that came at the start of the fifteenth at Hollywood and gave the Beavers a 5 to 4 win over the Twinks.

The game was tough and go until the final out which ended a Twink scoring threat as Del Young, batting for Bill Brenzel hit a double play.

Wayne Osborne, winning hurler, was assisted by three other members of the Portland pitching staff. Whitey Hilcher and Manuel Perez handled the twirling chores for the Twinks and yielded 15 bingles to 16 allowed by Beaver moundmen.

Seattle's disappointed San Francisco fans by halting the Seals climb into the upper division with a 5 to 0 shutout.

Hal Turpin, veteran Rainier chucker, turned out a six-hit performance as Rainier batsmen routed Tom Seals for 12 hits and all five runs before Ray Harrell took over in the eighth to hold the Rainiers to an additional safety.

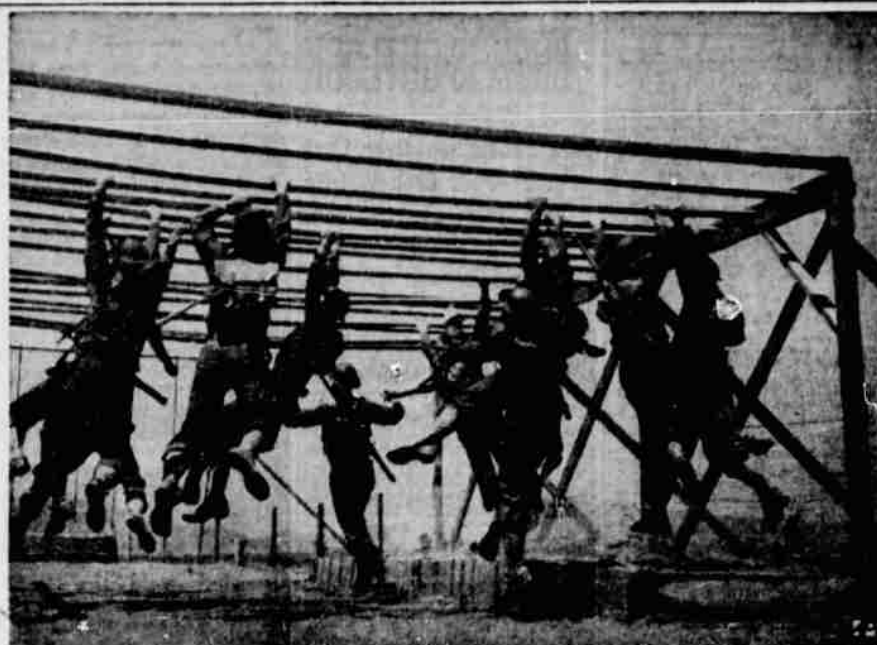
Sacs Shutout

Cochrane Picks Great Service Team to Send Against Big Leaguers

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Lieut. Gordon "Mickey" Cochrane, manager of the Service All-stars, has chosen 13 soldiers and 10 sailors to make up his team for the benefit game at Cleveland July 7 against the winner of the annual American league-National league all-star contest.

Furthermore, Manager Mickey is serious about winning the Cleveland classic. He has asked that his players be relieved of their military duties in time to report to him at the Great Lakes naval training station 10 days before the game for hard practice.

It is a powerful squad that Cochrane has picked, comprising the cream of big league talent that has answered the colors—Bobby Feller, Hank Greenberg, Cecil Travis, Don Padgett, Johnny Rigney and the others. Providing they can reach anything like top playing condition in 10 days of practice they should give their former compatriots a stiff argument in Cleveland's big stadium.

Two Army Grid Teams Slate Nationwide Tour for Relief

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Two powerful army football teams, made up of the finest college and professional talent in the service, will battle the clubs of the National professional league across the nation's gridirons this autumn in a series of games principally for the benefit of army emergency relief.

In six bustling weeks the two service eleven—one representing the "East" the other the "West"—expect to appear in cities all the way from Los Angeles to Boston and to reap a million dollars or more for charity. Their respective schedules still are far from fixed, but each of the principal cities of the north appears to be assured a look at one or the other of Uncle Sam's "dream" teams.

Organization of the gridiron program is in line with the military's present campaign to encourage every sort of competitive athletics and probably will serve to encourage schools and universities that might have worried about their football prospects for next fall. The army, like the navy, intends to set the example.

It is planned for the two army squads to begin training Aug. 22, one somewhere in the mid-west and the other on the east coast. Six days later the west team has a date with the professional Washington Redskins in the Los Angeles coliseum.

Army authorities have not yet selected the coaches, but it is virtually certain that Wallace Wade, famous as coach of the Duke Blue Devils and now major of a machine gun battalion, will handle the eastern squad. The coaches will pick their own squads and select training sites.

To make things handy for them, the army has compiled a list of 1500 football stars, past and present, professional and collegiate, who are in uniform now. All the coaches will need do is go down the list with their pencils and mark an "X" now and then when they detect a 200-pound halfback who can run the hundred yards in 10 seconds flat. No subsidizing. No proselytizing.

CRIP, CARLSTROM TO VIE IN MOUND BATTLE SATURDAY

The pitching duel of the year will probably be seen here Saturday night when Steve Crippen of the Medford Craters and Clyde Carlstrom of the Dorris (Cal.) Lumberjacks, both undefeated in three starts, oppose each other in the first game of a two-game Oregon-California league series that may produce an undisputed loop leader. The Saturday tilt will start at 9 p. m., that Sunday afternoon at 2:30.

Crippen, the curve-ball specialist of the Crater staff, has captured three of Medford's four victories, beating Klamath Falls in the season's opening series, 10 to 1 with four hits; Dorris the week following, 3 to 0 with two blows, and Grants Pass last Sunday, 5 to 4 with seven hits.

Carlstrom, also a curve-baller de luxe, flung four-hit ball to trim the Craters, 13 to 1 on May 23; blanked Grants Pass, 10 to 0 with three hits on Decoration day, and last Saturday evening pitched an eight-hitter to stop Klamath Falls, 11 to 3.

In three games Crippen has allowed only five runs and 13 hits, while Carlstrom, in the same number of contests, has yielded but four tallies and 15 knocks.

In Sunday's game, Manager Dutch Lieber will take the mound for the Craters against Jim Snyder, the Dorris southpaw whose best performance this season was a one-hit blanking of Grants Pass.

Medford, Dorris and Klamath Falls are currently tied for league leadership with four wins and two losses apiece. Grants Pass will travel to Klamath for Saturday night and Sunday afternoon games.

ROGER CRAMER IS LATEST TO REACH 2,000-HIT CLASS

Tiger Outfielder Gets Three Blows As Detroit Defeats Yankees—Giants Win.

Step by step the present stars of the major leagues are finding their way into the hallowed company of baseball's old-time all-time standouts.

The latest to earn a place on the permanent honor roll of the game is Roger (Doc) Cramer, the Detroit Tigers' outfielder, who made three hits against the New York Yankees yesterday to lift his lifetime total to 2,001, a level that has been reached by only seven other players still active in the major leagues.

Dick Bartell of the New York Giants entered the 2,000 hit class in April and Mel Ott, Paul and Lloyd Waner, Jimmie Foxx, Joe Cronin and Charley Gehringer already were there. Joe Medwick and Billy Herman of Brooklyn have a good chance of qualifying near the end of the season.

The three hits by Cramer were important individually, but they had nothing to do with the Tigers beating the world champions, 4-1. The blows that counted in that battle were a homer in the fifth by Jim Bloodworth and another by Ned Harris with two on in the fifth.

Braves Blanked
Paul Waner notched his 2,995th hit last night, but his Boston mates collected only three others off Rip Sewell, who pitched the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 3-0 shut-out over the Braves.

In another night contest, the New York Giants climbed into a third place tie in the National league with Cincinnati by beating the Reds, 6-1, their fifth straight victory over the Redlegs.

Big Bill Lee acquired his eighth victory of the season as the Chicago Cubs rallied for five runs in the seventh inning to beat the Phils, 5-2.

Weather kept the Brooklyn Dodgers idle at St. Louis again. The Boston Red Sox reinforced their hold on second place in the American league by trimming the St. Louis Browns, 10-3.

The Philadelphia White Sox made the Philadelphia Athletics exchange places in the cellar by beating the A's, 4-1.

The Cleveland Indians, held scoreless for eight innings by Buck Newsom, moved ahead with a three-run rally in the ninth, but had to go 12 innings to beat the Washington Senators, 4-3, in a night game.

AD LISKA WHIFFS 64 TO NEAR LEAD

Los Angeles, June 11.—(AP)—Blix Donnelly of Sacramento, Dick Barrett of Seattle and Ad Liska of Portland continue to set the pace in striking out batters in the Pacific Coast league games.

In games played through last Tuesday, Donnelly had whiffed 71 in winning seven games and losing five; Barrett, with a 12-3 win-loss record, and Liska, with a 6-8 record, each had fanned 64 hitters.

JAP LOSS HEAVY IS CHINESE CLAIM

London, June 11.—(AP)—Japanese losses in China up to the end of 1941 exceeded 2,000,000 killed and wounded, K. C. George Yeh, director of the Chinese ministry of information in London, declared today.

Yeh said he was unable to disclose Chinese casualties, but added grimly:

"I would be lying if I were to say we have suffered smaller losses than our enemy."

He said the Chinese were immobilizing more than 1,000,000 Japanese troops, including the forces in both China and Manchuria.

Large amounts of merchandise are being transported by air between various warring nations and their outposts and allies.
