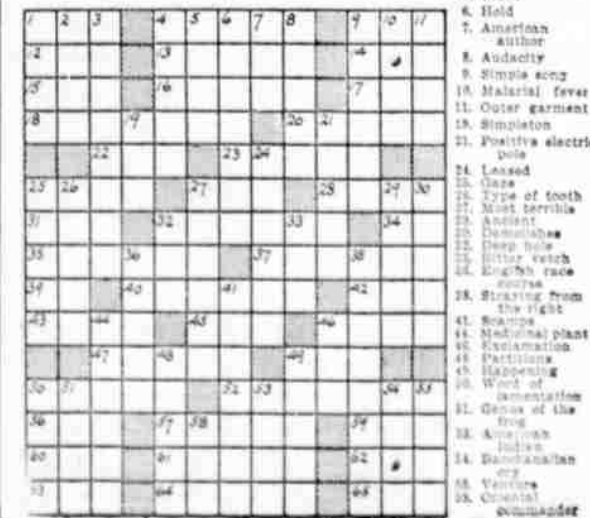

GROCCERS OPPOSE PAYING SNOOPERS

Chicago, June 11—(AP)—The National Association of Retail Grocers today asked congress to refuse to grant the office of price administration an appropriation of "several hundred million dollars for 100,000 new employees, largely enforcement personnel."

The action was taken at the association's 45th annual convention in a resolution which said the OPA proposal implied the turning loose of an "army of snoopers" on the retail merchants of the United States.

Favoring adoption of the resolution, Harry Walker of Baltimore, asserted he was "convinced that Washington is the only insane asylum that is run by its own inmates."

ECONOMY EFFORT CAUSE OF BATTLE

Washington, June 11—(AP)—An acrimonious fight on the House floor shaped up today over the demands of an economy bloc for wartime abolition of the WPA.

Less than a week after the House refused funds for continuance of the civilian conservation corps, Representative Taber, (R-N.Y.), said he would move to wipe out a proposed \$280,000,000 appropriation designed to give WPA employment to 400,000 persons a month.

"The WPA was created because of the depression and unemployment," said Taber, a ranking minority member of the appropriations committee. "There's no depression now here. There's little unemployment now, and there's no need for the WPA in wartime."
