CITY TREASURER HELD IN SHORTAGE

Roseburg, Ore., June 12—(AP)—Ray Reynolds, merchant and city treasurer at Myrtle Creek, was in custody here today charged with misappropriation of city funds. Although specifically accused of taking for his own use \$724.70 between the dates of Jan. 1 and May 19, of this year, Reynolds is alleged in a report of auditors to have a shortage of nearly \$11,000 in his records over a period of years since 1927, District Attorney J. V. Long reported. The audit reports, the district attorney stated, that the city treasurer has converted to his own use approximately \$9,400

of cash receipts since 1937, and that for 10 years previous to that time, and continuing until May 19 of this year, he had reported as paid to the municipal water department the bills charged against his firm amounting to a total of \$1,500.

OREGON HUNTERS DON'T AGREE ON LINKING SEASONS

Portland, June 12—(AP)—Oregon big-game hunters split today over proposed dovetailing of deer and elk seasons as the State Game commission opened a two-day session.

With arguments set for tomorrow, spokesmen for hunters in the western portion of the state indicated they are in general agreement with the proposal. Eastern Oregon delegations are opposed.

The deer season usually starts around September 20 and runs to October 25 with the elk season running from around November 1 to 15. Under the new proposal the deer season would be extended about one week and the elk season moved up proportionately.

The opposition view is that the number of hunters in the woods at one time would be increased, that animals would not be in good condition, that a long doleful season in warmer weather would increase spoilage of meat.

Western support contends that the dovetailed season would be better from the standpoint of tire and gasoline conditions, that more deer and elk would be killed in areas where they have increased most, that many persons would be enabled to lay in bigger supplies of meat for cold storage.

OLD RUBBER DRIVE TO START JUNE 15 SAYS ROOSEVELT

Search of Basements, Attics and Back Yards Asked—Take to Filling Stations.

Washington, June 12—(AP)—President Roosevelt announced today an intensive campaign for collection of the nation's old scrap rubber supply would start June 15 and last through June 30.

Individuals were urged by the chief executive to search their basements, attics and back yards for all items of rubber that have been discarded or can be discarded.

Offices, factories and farms also are being asked to cooperate.

Through arrangements with the oil industry 400,000 filling stations will serve as collection depots. They will pay one cent a pound for the rubber brought in, and the government will reimburse them that sum.

President Roosevelt, declaring that the rubber situation was extremely serious, again urged the people to cut down on pleasure driving and reduce both automobile speed and mileage.

He told a press conference he had no idea when a person with four tires might be able to get new ones. It may be a long, long time, he said. So, he added, it is a matter of common sense to make existing tires wear as long as possible.
