

CHERRY TREES IN SOME AREAS HIT BY NEW DISEASES

Buckskin, Mottle Leaf Easily Recognized Virus Symptom Says Agent Cordy.

A set of new cherry diseases has appeared in some areas of the Northwest in the last few years. These diseases are caused by a virus and can be controlled only by removal of the affected trees.

It is, of course, very much to our interest to keep these diseases from becoming established in this county. A survey is being made at this time to determine if any of these diseases are now present here, we hope of course that there are none.

There is a long list of names of virus diseases, but two that have fairly definite symptoms are buckskin and mottle leaf. These could be recognized by any grower and reported.

Typical Symptoms
The most typical symptoms of virus diseases is the small size of cherries on affected branches and their refusal to color or ripen. Even after the normal cherries are harvested, the affected cherries remain small and green and hang on the tree. In a few years diseased limbs in the trees may die.

On mottle leaf, the most typical symptom is a mottling of the leaves. Later these mottled areas dry up and fall out leaving a severe shot hole or lace

leaf affect. It should be noted that unlike other shot hole diseases, the shot holes caused by mottle leaf may cross veins. If all the shot holes are between the veins then it is not caused by mottle leaf.

There are other virus diseases that deform the leaves and fruits. As a rule the limbs and trees are not killed by virus diseases so please do not report these. There are also a large number of trees at the present time that have a lot of small red cherries that are dropping. This is not a disease, but lack of pollination.

Spread By Grafting
The only two known means of spread of these diseases is by grafting and by sucking insects. Which insects spread them are not known.

As an effort is being made to determine if these diseases are present, it would be appreciated if anyone having a tree with these symptoms would bring a typical branch to this office. It is impossible to tell if trees that are dead or nearly dead have been effected.
