

NEED VOLUNTEERS TO HELP PROTECT NATIONAL FOREST

Will Be Called For Duty Only
in Case of Dire Emergency
—Paid While Working.

Plans for the formation of a volunteer forest fire protection unit, to be composed of civilians who would be available in case of extreme emergencies for work vital in the protection of valuable timber, were announced today by M. L. Tedrow, fire assistant for the Rogue River National forest.

Tedrow said that those volunteering would be subject to call only in cases of dire emergency, for duty as special guards, patrols, truck drivers, packers, pump operators, lookouts, smoke chasers, fire foremen, cooks and first aid men. He added that volunteers with experience in the woods would be extremely welcome. All volunteers, he said, would receive payment commensurate with the time they put in and the type of work they did.

Want Businessmen
Business men who might be more readily available for duty as volunteers will be preferred over laborers and those working for others, who might not be able to arrange to leave their regular employment, Tedrow stated.

Those wishing to volunteer for this highly important service are urged to contact, before July 1, either Tedrow in the forest service office in the federal building or rangers at any of the ranger stations in the district.

HITLERITES VISIT SADISTIC CRUELTY ON HAPLESS JEWS

Barred From Business; Property Confiscated—Wear Arm Band on Streets.

New York, June 12—(Wide World)—Because of Adolf Hitler's blind hatred, the Jew is a marked man wherever Nazism holds sway.

The yellow six-pointed star with the German word "Jude" or its Czech or Dutch or other foreign language equivalent points him out as a person who must be avoided.

In Nazi Germany the treatment of the Jew has alternated between broken promises and sadistic cruelty. That the Jew would be removed from public office and possibly also dislodged from cultural positions of influence, once the Nazis came into power, was apparent long before Adolf Hitler took over on Jan. 30, 1933.

Barred From Shops
The Nazis themselves, however, were careful to say that the Jew could continue in business. Soon he was not only barred from every form of business and his property virtually confiscated. Today he is unable even to go into a shop except during certain hours, and then only if there is no sign to the effect that "we don't sell to Jews."

Restaurants are closed to the Jew. If he is found in a movie performance or at a concert or in a theater, the concentration camp is certain for him.
In 1934 the so-called Nuremberg laws defining the status of the Jew were passed by the reichstag during the Nazi party annual convention. The laws were stringent, but the Jew thought that at least now there was a clearly defined basis for his further existence in the reich.

Beyond Pale
The Nuremberg laws have long been put in the discard except when it is possible to invoke them to the disfavor of the Jew. The plain fact is that the Jew stands beyond the pale of any law. Until quite recently, he still had the comforting thought in some cases that the firm in whose services he had grown grey would continue to pay him the pension accorded all faithful

Rationing Victim Vents Feelings in Poetry for Board

"And when I die, please bury me

But last March 25, Hitler decreed that all firms must report what pensions they still pay Jews. Everyone acquainted with Nazi practices knew instinctively that this foreshadowed the cancellation of pensions for Jews. The extraordinary powers voted to Hitler by the reichstag April 28, whereby he can do anything he pleases without even the semblance of due process of law, confirmed this fear.

Marked Men

It now comes to this: Any Jew appearing on the streets is marked by a Jew-star band. If he waits for a street car, his Aryan fellow commuters have the right to climb into the vehicle first. Since all cars are crowded in wartime during rush hours because of the exceedingly limited service, the Jew might as well give up hope of securing transportation. He is not allowed to take a taxi; and he is not permitted to enter a railway train except with a special permit.

But supposing he had the rare

good fortune of crowding on to an omnibus or street car: He may not take a seat unless Aryans have first been seated, on many an occasion we Americans have encountered angry glares by dyed-in-the-wool nazis for offering our seats to some emaciated, bent old Jewish lady.

On the other hand it must be said that we also at times witnessed scenes of real courage, especially on the part of German men in military uniforms, who likewise yielded their places when some particularly miserable-looking Jewish individual entered.

MERCHANT SHIP GETS SUBMARINE

Havana, June 12—(AP)—A United States merchant ship rammed, shelled and apparently sank a submarine which had machine-gunned her as she was nearing a Cuban port about ten days ago, press dispatches from a Cuban coastal city said today.

The submarine surfaced a few miles offshore. Two men came up on deck and immediately began machine-gunning the U. S. ship.

Artillerymen aboard the American ship replied, with two of their shots striking the conning tower.

The captain then put his ship across the submarine and the success of his maneuver was apparent when a great oil slick welled up to the surface.

Reports from the coastal city said only one of the American crew was injured by the sub's machine-gun fire.

EIGHT DIE IN FALL OF ARMY BOMBER

Sarasota, Fla., June 12—(AP)—Eight army fliers were killed and two injured early today when a four-engined bomber crashed into Sarasota bay.

Major Gardiner Fiske, Sarasota air base intelligence officer, said the heavy ship had cleared the runway on a pre-dawn training flight and gone about a mile when it went out of control. It landed on its back in a foot and a half of water about 200 feet from shore and two of the crew were pulled from the wreckage with only minor injuries.
