

PORTLANDERS GET BONDS AND KISSES FROM FILM STAR

Beauteous Lana Turner Leads Sales Campaign—Total Tops 'Frisco, Seattle

Portland, June 12.—(P)—Portlanders had \$379,000 in war bonds today and a dozen of the buyers had the memory of Lana Turner's kisses as an early dividend.

At the city's Victory Center yesterday the blond film star more than lived up to her promise of giving a kiss to the buyer of the largest bond.

Frederick Freed, 21, got a pair of them—one for a \$5,000 bond and one because he is going into the navy next month. When other buyers upped their purchases into five figures, Miss Turner increased her contribution to the sales effort.

A number of unions, organizations and individuals bought \$10,000 and more in bonds, three going up to \$50,000.

It was the largest single day of sales here and topped the \$80,000 reported at San Francisco when Miss Turner appeared. It likewise was well ahead of Seattle's biggest day to date, \$165,000, local bond sales officials said.

CONVEYOR BELT HOMES LOOM IN POST-WAR ERA

Millions of Stylish Low-Cost Residences Visioned for Transplanted Workers.

Chicago—(U.P.)—Housing and furnishing experts believe the war's impact may hasten the day when millions of stylish, low-cost homes slide down a "conveyor belt" to be purchased by families who once lived in cheap tenements.

What was looked upon as an emergency solution to the problem of sheltering more than 500,000 of the nation's transplanted war production workers may prove to be "the beginning of mass production methods in home construction," according to Percy Wilson, managing director of the Chicago Merchandise Mart.

Wilson said the war housing emergency for the first time had "diverted the attention of the building industry's best resources from the more expensive types of homes."

Average Cost \$3,800

He said the housing program—with "Uncle Sam" in the role of underwriting agent and the nation's top architects and interior designers taking a hand—was "introducing among workers aesthetic values never before emphasized in low and medium cost construction."

A recent display of "a dozen typical war homes" at the Merchandise Mart's home furnishings market gave an indication of the "long-range implications" of the war-home program, Wilson said.

Attractive model homes—single and multiple units of four and five rooms—averaged \$3,800 in construction costs and \$490 in furnishings.

The exhibit, sponsored by the National Retail Furniture association and the U. S. public building administration, proved home furnishing manufacturers and interior designers are alert to opportunities afforded by the program," he said.

A Building Revolution

"With their resources now concentrated in this field, it is expected revolutionary advances will be effected in design and economy and that charm and efficiency in the small home will be merged as never before."

He said the emergency program had effected a revolution in the building industry by "inducing a certain coordination which might conceivably be the beginning of mass production methods in construction."

industry, alone of all industrial giants, resisted this trend, remaining in this day of super-organization a comparatively loose federation of crafts, trades and professions.

Construction Codes Obsolete

"Not organized in the past for large scale production, the building industry has been forced to devote its major attention to the more expensive types of building construction, because it did not have volume in the lower brackets to warrant using there the industry's best resources. Moreover, research which would have led to low cost housing innovations has been in the past defeated by rigid and obsolete building codes, which in the emergency may be relaxed."

He said studies made of defense workers' wants in furnishings indicated they were concerned primarily with style and color. Other preferences in descending order were: price, quality, size and durability.
