

CAMP WHITE MEN BOND PURCHASES \$44,625 IN WEEK

Other Sales Bring Total To
\$51,175 at Postoffice
Last Seven Days.

War bonds totaling \$51,175 were purchased through the Medford postoffice for the week ending at noon yesterday, far exceeding the purchase figure for any one month since the inauguration of the bond sale campaign, it was announced by Frank DeSousa, postmaster.

Of this huge amount, \$44,625 worth of war bonds were bought by workmen at Camp White on the payroll deduction plan, with the balance, of \$6,550 worth of bonds, being purchased by local persons at postoffice windows. Most of the bonds were of the \$25 type, although two \$1,000 bonds were purchased, the postmaster stated.

Sale of the bonds to Camp White workers was handled by W. R. Dolbeer, bond clerk for contractors of the Medford cantonment. He was stationed at the cantonment.

In order to handle the sale of the approximately 1,750 war bonds, it was necessary for the postoffice to assign 12 clerks to the task. Through the cooperation of Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue River National Forest and E. P. Leavitt, superintendent of Crater Lake National Park, these clerks were permitted the use of the forest and park service offices and typewriters in the federal building, thus greatly expediting clearance of the transactions.

Cantonment workers purchased the bonds through their employers, who filed applications at the postoffice. The bonds were paid for, then delivered to the contractors for distribution to the individual employees. The sale for this week is expected to be as large as it was the past six days, Mr. DeSousa said.

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PATTERSON SAYS PEARS OF VALLEY ENJOYED IN NAVY

Medford pears are providing welcome eating for men in the United States armed forces. This was proved by a unique letter received recently by Bert Orr of the Del Rio orchards from G. E. Patterson of the quartermaster corps, U. S. navy, former navy recruiter in Medford.

The letter was written on the blank side of a big Del Rio orchards label, which Patterson had removed from a box of fancy grade pears grown and packed by the orchards, and which was on board Patterson's ship.

The letter, written from "somewhere in the South Pacific," and undated, said in part: "I want to let you know that we do have some good pears to eat even though we are a long ways from home. This load must have been selected for us as they were so solid that on our trip to the far south we had to put them in the tropical sun for a few weeks before they were good and ripe."

Patterson, who left here in 1940 after serving as navy recruiter for about two and one half years, was at first believed to have been aboard the Lexington, big aircraft carrier sunk in the Coral sea battle, but recent letters received here by friends have tended to cast a doubt on whether he was on the craft.
