

State Game Commission Dovetails Deer and Elk Hunting Seasons.

DEER HUNTING TO START SEPT. 27, AND END OCT. 31

Action Waits Final Approval As A War Measure—Other Rulings.

Portland, June 13—(P)—The state game commission today tentatively dovetailed the deer and elk hunting seasons as a war measure.

Final approval or amendment of the action will not be made until the next meeting June 27, the commission said, giving sportsmen the intervening time in which to file arguments.

Under the new schedule, the deer season will run from September 27 to October 31 and the elk season for eastern Oregon from October 28 to December 1. Only exception was Wallawa county where the elk season will close November 15.

Travel limitations prompted dovetailing the seasons. Other commission actions, which also are tentative until the June 27 meeting:

1. Three thousand permits to kill does in Grant county will be sold at \$3.50 each; 2,000 permits to kill elk cows in the Umatilla area at \$5 each.
2. Bull elk season in Coos and Douglas counties will run from August 23 to 31.
3. Bear season will open September 27 and close October 31, with a limit of one.
4. Eastern Oregon antelope season will be September 23-30 with one of either sex the limit.
5. The Salt Creek game refuge in Lane county will be open. The Ochoco refuge will be closed. Otherwise last year's regulations on refuges will remain in effect.
6. Checking system for elk and antelope will be abandoned this year because of inability to hire checkers for the 29 stations operated last year. Hunters will be required to report kills by mail.

PHEASANT SEASON
The Upland pheasant season will be Oct. 17 to Nov. 1, inclusive. The bag limit will be four cocks a day, but not more than eight cocks in seven consecutive days or in possession. In Malheur county one hen may be included in the weekly bag of eight birds. In Klamath county the season will be Nov. 15 to 30. In Wheeler and Lake counties it will be Oct. 17, 18, 21, 24, 25 and 28, and the limit will be three cocks in one day but not more than nine in the season. Harney and Jefferson counties' bag limits will be the same as Wheeler and Lake.

8. The Willamette Valley pheasant season will be Oct. 17, 18 and 21. Bag limit will be two cocks a day, but not more than four in the season.

ARABIAN PRINCE AND CRAIG MEET ON ARMORY CARD

Prince Selaki Mihalikis, author, lecturer, champion high-diver, composer, and, as an afterthought, one of the best wrestlers in the game today, returns to Medford Monday night after an absence of over two years to face Camp White's George Craig, a blacksmith by trade, in the middle event of Promoter Mack Lillard's weekly mat card in the armory.

Mihalikis, an Arabian prince and no fooling, is extremely well-known to southern Oregon grapple fadom. Prior to his leaving here for a mat tour of the nation he was one of the best drawing cards Lillard had under his wing. For a long time he stuck strictly to legitimate activity in the ring, but toward the end of his local stay he became something less than an angel.

Just what type of a grappler Mihalikis happens to be at this time is not definitely known, but Lillard reports that rumors have reached his ears telling of the Prince's utter disregard of straight, clean matwork. If these rumors are based on fact Craig has his work cut out for him, because Mihalikis can be a mighty tough customer when he wants to be.

The one-hour main event will find Sockeye Jack McDonald clashing with Chief Thunderbird in a battle of giants, with the ex-Tacoma logger given a slight edge over his Indian opponent.

In the four-round opener, slated to start at 8:30 sharp, Pete Belcastro will pit his dirty tactics against clean-wrestling Alberto Corral, Mexican favorite.

LITTLE MANGRUM LEAD GOLF FIELD

Toledo, O., June 13—(P)—Lawson Little, former grand slam amateur champion, and partner Lloyd Mangrum, won two matches today in the Inverness invitational four-ball golf classic, jumping far ahead of the field at the end of five of seven rounds in the race for the \$7,650 best-ball pot of gold.

The leaders, with a plus 13 for the five rounds, handed Herman Keiser and Chandler Harper, Miami best-ball winners, a one-down defeat this morning, and then came back to tour the front nine in 28 strokes, seven under par and one under the previous tournament record, for a five up decision over Jimmy Hines and Herman Barron this afternoon.

DEMPSEY ENTERS COAST GUARD AS 'ROUGH 'EM' COACH

Headline Athletes In Navy—Start Gunnery and Fire Drills Monday.

New York, June 13—(P)—Jack Dempsey, who said he was happier than the day he won the world heavyweight boxing title, was sworn in today as a lieutenant, senior grade, in the U. S. coast guard.

Commissioned to head the coast guard's physical training program at the service's Manhattan East station on Long Island, the former champion vowed "I am going to teach them all the rough stuff."

"This is a rough, tough war and the marquis of queensberry rules are out," he said. "My students will learn the dirty and most effective way to fight."

The use of knives in close combat would be taught, he disclosed, hastening to add, however, that wooden knives would be used at the start to avoid accidents.

Dempsey, who was turned down twice by the army because of his age, said he was giving up all his civilian activities.

Washington, June 13—(P)—The navy department announced today that many of the nation's headline athletes now stationed at its Norfolk school for physical instructors had been ordered to training in gunnery and fire control in preparation for assignment to battle stations at sea.

Rear Admiral Randall Jacobs, chief of navy personnel, had directed that the physical training instructors also be given courses in combat duty.

Naval officials said there were approximately 3,000 men in the navy's physical training branch starting Monday.

PORTLAND SHAVED LOWER IN CELLAR

Hollywood, June 13—(P)—Hollywood clinched its Coast league series with Portland today, sinking the visitors deeper into the cellar with a 7-3 decision. The Portlanders completed five double plays, equalizing the league record.

The Stars pounced on veteran Byron Speece and Tillie Schafer for a dozen hits, running their total for the five games of the series to 69 base blows. Johnny Dickshot of Hollywood and Johnny Leovich and Lee Stine connected for home runs. Portland touched Roy (Pappy) Joiner for 10 hits, but most of them, including the homers, came when the game was on ice for the locals.

LIEBER OR WIMER TO FACE DORRIS ON MOUND TODAY

Manager Charles (Dutch) Lieber sends his Medford Craters against the hard-clouting Dorris (Cal.) Lumberjacks at 2 o'clock this afternoon in the second game of a two-game Oregon-California league series, and either the herd man himself, or Lefty Al Wimer will face the invaders from the flinging mound. Fairgrounds park, a short distance south on the Pacific highway, is the game's locale.

Jovial Red Tolbert of the Lumberjacks is expected to give his pitching nod to Jim Snyder, a southpaw of considerable prowess. Snyder, on Decoration day, turned in the loop's best hurling trick to date, blanking the Grants Pass Merchants with one hit.

While Medford and Dorris are battling it out here, Grants Pass and the Klamath Falls Pelicans will be staging the second of their two-game set at Klamath Falls. First tilts of both series were played last night.

Lieber, who has been bothered with a sore arm for two weeks, probably won't know until just before the bell whether he or the slim left-hander, Wimer, will walk to the Crater rubber. Lieber's last stint was a four-inning operation against Grants Pass last Sunday, during which he did OK with three whiffs, three blows and one run allowed.

Wimer, working for the first time this season in Crater uniform, finished the contest and yielded three hits and one run in five frames, while striking out five. He's not very fast but possesses a baffling outside delivery and has fine control. Medford won the game, 10 to 2.

The last time the Craters faced Snyder, on May 24, they beat him, 3 to 0, as Steve Crippen came up with a two-hit pitching job. Snyder was rapped for 13 hits, four of them by Don Fawcett, but the blows were so scattered that the best the locals could do was turn them into a trio of tallies.

Medford is expected to take the field this afternoon with Glen Swanson catching, Lieber or Crippen on first, Johnny Gitzen on second, Norm Worthley on short, Fawcett on third, Dwight Catherwood in left, Al Wray Lightner in center and Madden in right.

The Lumberjacks, boasting their strongest team in history, will line up with Bart Goldbar, catching, Jack Duracha on first, Orlo Oakes on second, the sensational Bill Crisp on short, Earl Brooks on third, DeVore in left, Gaspari in center and Snively in right.

Not counting games of last night, Medford, Dorris and Klamath Falls were deadlocked for the league leadership with four victories and two defeats apiece.

The Craters announced that the strong Bear Photo team of San Francisco would play a two-game series here next Saturday night and Sunday afternoon to make up for the series which was postponed because of unfavorable weather. The regular two-game league series with the Grants Pass Merchants slated for next week-end will be split up, the first tilt being played here next Wednesday evening and the second game the following Wednesday evening, to make way for the Bear Photo games.

EIGHTH STRAIGHT NCAA TITLE WON BY TROJAN TEAM

Lincoln, Neb., June 13—(P)—Southern California won its eighth straight N. C. A. A. track championships tonight with 85 1/2 points.

The Trojans gained but one first, by Cliff Bourland in the 440, but scored in ten of the 14 events. Ohio state was second with 44.

There were no records set or equalled. Two boys took home double championships, Hal Davis of California, in the 100 and 220 and Bob Wright, Ohio State, who successfully defended his hurdle title.

Les MacMitchell of New York university suffered his first NCAA mile run defeat of his college career tonight when, in the opening event of the finals of the annual event, he ran third behind Bob Ginn of Nebraska, and Leroy Weed of Southern California.

Ginn, a mile of lead, won with a desperate lunge at the tape, leaving Weed about a foot behind. Ginn's time was 4:11.1.

MacMitchell never was better than third in the race. For two laps Francis Conforti of Notre

Dame held the lead, but on the back stretch of the third lap, Weed went into the lead by two yards over Ginn, Conforti dropping back to fourth.

Weed held his lead until the runners were but a few yards from the last turn. Then Ginn got a yard advantage. As they came down the stretch Ginn seemed to waver and Weed looked the winner. But at a yard from the tape, Ginn made his lunge to win, falling flat on his back after breaking the tape.
