

CZECH CHIEFTAN URGES REPRISALS FOR NAZI TOWNS

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—Destruction of "several" German villages by air bombardment was urged upon the United Nations today by Jan Masaryk, Czechoslovakian vice-premier and foreign minister, as retaliation for the wiping out of the whole Czech town of Lidice by German vengeance squads.

Masaryk said he had received many messages of sympathy after the German announcement Wednesday that the Bohemian village of 1,200 had been destroyed and all its male inhabitants killed for allegedly harboring the two assassins of Reinhard Heydrich.

In a formal statement issued through the Czechoslovakian legation, Masaryk expressed gratitude for condemnation of the Lidice incident by American public opinion, but said "sympathy and condemnations are not enough."

"It seems to me that the time has come to pay the Germans in kind," he added.

"I think that the brave, wonderful pilots of the United Nations should destroy several German villages and for every defenseless man, woman and child in the occupied countries, at least the same number of deploded Germans should pay the supreme price x x x."

John Garfield In Dramatic Film On Program At Holly

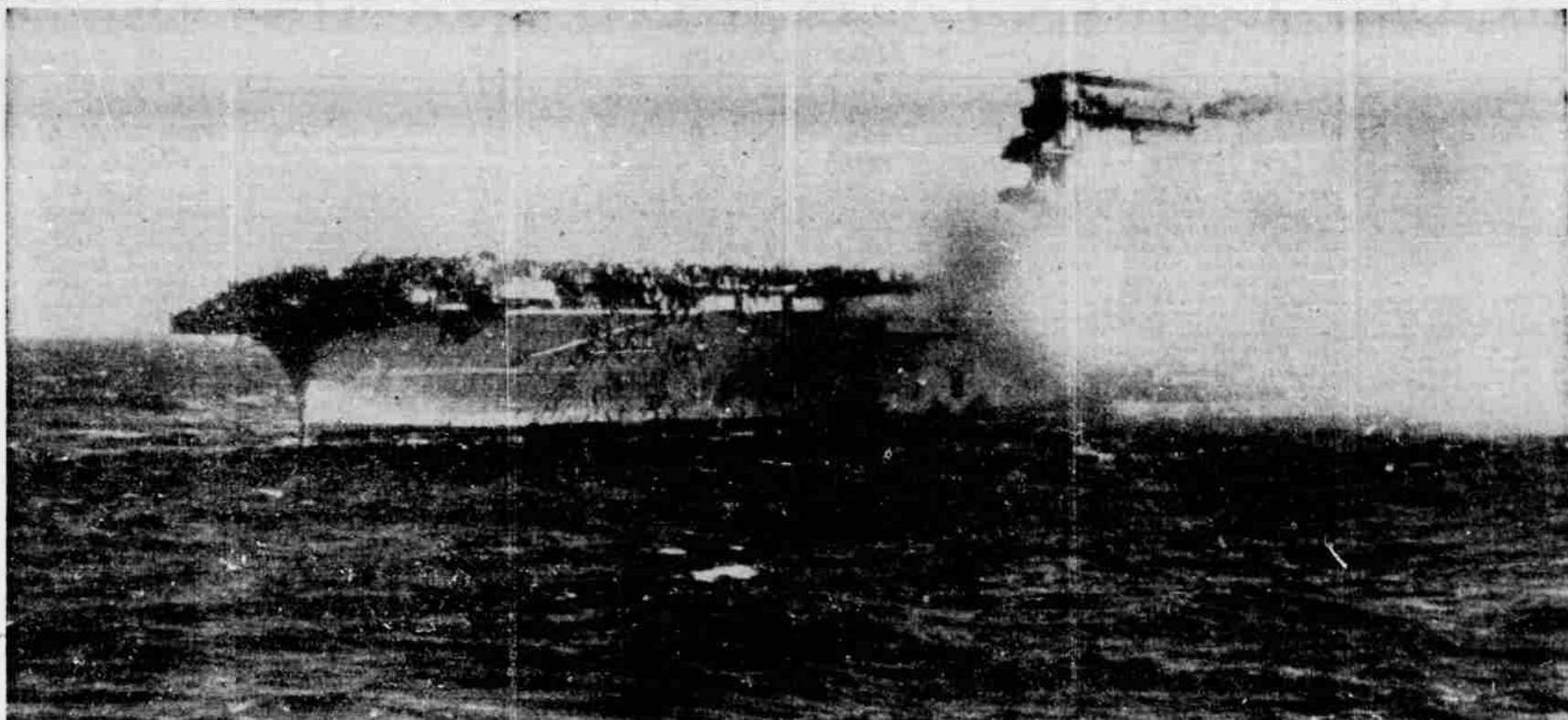

ORDER STRIKERS TO QUIT OR WORK

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—The war labor board delivered a ultimatum today to 125 strikers at the Arkwright corporation, Fall River, Mass., textile concern, to return to work Monday or forfeit their jobs.

In a telegram to each of the strikers Chairman William H. Davis of the WLB said the strikers were guilty of "disloyalty and dishonor" because of the circumstances of the work stoppage.

The strikers are members of an independent union, the American Federation of Textile Operatives.

Davis said the strike had thrown 800 to 900 other employees out of work, bringing war production in the plant to a standstill.
