War Censorship Topic Discussion At Pro America

"Censorship in Time of War" was the topic discussed by Herb Grey at the Pro America meeting held last Monday evening at the J. C. Boyle residence on South Oakdale avenue. The speaker pointed out that "America can take it" as well as England and should be told the truth concerning military events as soon as the information will be of no value to the enemy.

He explained that the English form of censorship has resulted in greater effort and cooperation from the people by telling them the truth and giving them the facts. He said that "we might well profit by this example."

He emphasized the need of complete overhaul of the present plan of revealing public information and urged a coordinated head through which censorship and news should be handled.

Mr. Grey argued that unless wisdom and common sense are used the press and radio will lose prestige and the public will lose faith in those who guide the military and political destinies. He said that the press and radio have cooperated and will continue to work willingly and completely with military leaders, yet a vigorous protest should be registered against the type of censorship which has been in effect since Pearl Harbor.

Mrs. C. L. Hopkins, who presided at the meeting, reviewed the policy of the Republican party. It was announced that the next meeting will be addressed by Harris Ellsworth of Roseburg, successful candidate for the Republican nomination for representative from the newly formed fourth district.
