Non-denominational it is dependent upon the state, community chest, W. C. T. U., churches, granges and other organizations for maintenance. More than 1,100 children have been housed since its organization.

A class in Red Cross organization and policy has been announced by Mrs. W. H. Fluhrer, chairman of the Staff Assistance corps of the Red Cross. The class will be held Monday through Friday, beginning July 6, from 10 a. m. until 12 noon in the county court house auditorium.

METHODIST VIEWS ON PRESENT WAR AND PEACE AINED

Yakima, June 13—(AP)—Methodists, holding their northwest conference here, gave most of their time today to a discussion of the present war and the future peace.

Chapin D. Foster, Chehalis, presented the report, which was adopted, for the conference committee on world peace. It protested starvation blockades as "cruel weapons that deny brotherhood and contain the seeds of future wars" and urged a number of changes in the post-war era. One resolution called for an immediate end to discrimination against the Negro and another asked that appreciation be sent to brethren of the Japanese race for the "splendid manner" in which they have borne removal to concentration camps.
Major interest outside of conference sessions is still in ministerial assignments which will not be available until closing session. Chehalis was given the next conference.

OREGON PASTOR PASSES

Portland, Ore., June 13—(AP) The Rev. T. A. Schoenberg, 64, pastor at St. Mark's Lutheran church here and veteran member of the Pacific synod of the United Lutheran church, died early today.

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
