DOCTORS IRKED BY M'NUTT'S CHARGE OF INTEREST LACK

Portland, Ore., June 15—(P)—In a diatribe over a federal official's remarks about their attitude on the war, northwest physicians and surgeons completed plans today for their 20th annual meeting here.

The Pacific Northwest Medical association convention will be opened Wednesday with about 300 Oregon, Washington and Idaho medics attending. It will be closed Saturday.

Their ire was aroused by a statement by Paul V. McNutt, federal security administrator, that the government might expect pressure upon the profession to obtain war volunteers, at the American Medical association convention at Atlantic City.

The Oregon State Medical Society wired an immediate protest to McNutt, and reply, if any, was to be aired at a luncheon meeting Saturday.

The telegram, sent by Dr. Richard B. Adams, public policy committee chairman, said in part:

"Many of our members have applied to army medical corps months ago but to date have heard nothing concerning their applications. Other members have received commissions two and three months ago but have not yet been called to active duty. Know of no physician in our community who is not working 12 hours or more every day. We deeply resent implications in Mr. McNutt's speech as reported by Associated Press."

BRITISH ATTEMPT TO HALT ROMMEL MARCH TO COAST

Cairo, Egypt, June 15—(P)—A fluid battle raged on the desert approaches to Tobruk today as the British sought to adjust their positions while from the rear they violently attacked the axis columns of Field Marshal Erwin Rommel which were nudging a wedge toward the coast.

The British said the Germans were attacking near Acroma in an effort to reach the coast and "isolate the troops remaining in the Ain El Gazala Salient," the coastal anchor of the former line of minefields 40 miles west of Tobruk.

Already the southern anchor at Bir Hacheim has been wiped out.

The British indicated a threat to another of their fortified boxes at El Adem, south of Tobruk, has been eased by clearing the enemy out of the area to the east of that point.

With Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's land forces still hammering at British lines defending Tobruk the German air force has opened an assault on British supply lines extending nearly 200 miles back to Egypt, an RAF communique reported today.

DARWIN BOMBED FOR THIRD TIME BY JAP PLANES

Few Casualties in Latest of Raid Series—Four Shot Down in Sunday Attempt

Allied Headquarters, Australia, June 15—(P)—Darwin, Australia's north coast base, was raided by Japanese warplanes today for the third successive day and a few casualties resulted, General MacArthur's headquarters announced.

Twenty-seven Japanese bombers escorted by fighters, the largest force yet to reach Darwin in the series of assaults over the week-end, came over this afternoon. The headquarters announcement, which was not a formal communique, said damage was slight.

Formed fliers, who tore into a formation of 18 to 25 Japanese fighters over Darwin yesterday, shooting down four in a furious dogfight, were credited officially today with saving that North Australian city from another air raid.

The Japanese fighter squadron, General MacArthur's headquarters said, apparently was covering a formation of bombers lurking off the coast to repeat Saturday's assault on Darwin.

The Japanese were admitted today to be closing their Chekiang-Kiangsi pincers on the Chinese defenders of the last unquarrelled stretch of the railway linking Hangow and Nanchang. The Chinese command admitted loss of Yushan, between Kwangfeng and the provincial border.

Somewhat tempering the Japanese success, Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek's warriors were reported today to have captured positions within rifle shot of Nanchang, enemy base in Kiangsi province.

Tokyo, still trying to recover face for the recent naval licking off Midway island, announced today that the Japanese had sunk a cruiser of the "San Francisco type" and a submarine in that battle. The United States navy has announced its losses in that battle as one destroyer sunk and an aircraft carrier damaged.

There is no "San Francisco type" cruiser. There is, however, a San Francisco, one of seven cruisers of the Minneapolis class, carrying from 9,375 to 9,950 tons each.

GRANGERS OPEN WEEK'S SESSION 6 IN UNNECESSARY PARACHUTE JUMP

Milwaukee, June 15—(P)—The week-long state grange convention opened here today. The meeting will witness the retirement of Ray W. Gill Portland, state master for 10 years. Morton Tompkins, former overseer, will be installed Friday, replacing him.

Gill's speech highlighted the program today. Other talks scheduled are: Governor Sprague at 4 p. m. Tuesday, Palmer Hoyt, publisher of the Oregonian, at 8 p. m. Tuesday, and William O. Douglas, U. S. supreme court justice, at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday.

MacLeod, Alberta, June 15—(P)—Two Canadian bombers collided in the air northeast of Granum today, killing an undetermined number of Canadian air force fliers. The planes were in formation.

SUGAR RATION FOR CANNING PURPOSE HIKE FOR SEASON

Householder May Obtain Sugar to Can Amount Equal to Last Season.

Seattle, June 15—(P)—Arthur J. Kross, assistant in charge of sugar rationing in Washington, said that he had notified sugar rationing officials today of a new liberalization in allowances for fruit canning this season.

He said that on advice from neighboring states, and to prevent waste of fruit, householders will be permitted sugar to preserve as much fruit as they did last year.

Heretofore, the allowance for canning has been limited to 36 quarts per person, at the rate of one pound of sugar for each four quarts of fruit. The new allowance will remain at one pound per four quarts, but rationing boards will be authorized to permit a household to obtain sufficient canning sugar, at that rate, to equal the number of quarts of fruit it "put up" last year.

Liberalization of the allowance for fruit canning is being observed by the local rationing board, employees of the board in the Sparta building said today.

The ration board announced to the public new office hours, 10:30 a. m. until 5:15 p. m. week days except Tuesday and Friday when the office is open at 9 a. m. These hours have been put in to effect due to the increased work as a result of sugar for canning registration, it was explained.

Norwegians Battle Quisling Followers

London, June 15—(P)—A Reuters dispatch from Stockholm reported today that many persons were wounded in Norway in a battle between followers of Vidkun Quisling, pro-Nazi premier, and other Norwegians in the towns of Rissa and Selbu, near Trondheim.

Armed quislingites were said to have entered the towns to "take reprisals" against the population but to have encountered fierce resistance.

Disturbances were reported also at Trondheim.

DR. HENDERSON DIES
Tacoma, June 15—(P)—Dr. Louis F. Henderson, head of the botany department at the University of Oregon for 13 years and then curator of the herbarium and professor emeritus at the Eugene institution until his retirement four years ago, died in a Tacoma hospital yesterday at the age of 88 years.
