

FATHER MEYER TO HEAD PARISH IN PORTLAND AREA

Farewell Party Thursday For Assistant To Father Black of Catholic Church.

Father Augustine A. Meyer, assistant here for the past five years to Father Francis W. Black, pastor of Sacred Heart parish, has been promoted to the pastorate of a parish in the vicinity of Portland and will leave here a week from next Sunday to assume his new position.

In recognition of the fine work done by Father Meyer during his stay in Medford, a farewell party in his honor will be held in the parish hall at 8 o'clock Thursday night, at which time he will be presented with a suitable purse. All members of the parish are urged to attend.

Parish Unnamed
Father Meyer's appointment came through Archbishop Howard of Portland, but the name of the parish of which he will become pastor is not yet known, according to Father Black. Father Meyer returned last night by plane from Portland, where he had gone to receive the appointment.

The appointment, Father Meyer's first since his ordination, will take effect within the next two weeks.

Father Black announced that Father Meyer's place would be taken by Father James Hamilton of Portland, who was ordained from St. Edwards' seminary in Seattle on May 30.

NAVAL OFFICERS WILL BE SOUGHT BY RECRUITERS

According to word received from Commander A. J. Byrholdt, director of naval officer procurement, 13th naval district, Seattle, two naval officers will arrive in Medford this evening to interview candidates for commission as naval officers. They are Lieut. Commander J. G. Thwing, aide to the director, and Lieut. W. H. Hutchens, medical corps, who will conduct physical examinations. Their headquarters will be in the Medford hotel lobby from 9 a. m. until 4 p. m. on Wednesday.

Particularly desired are college graduates married or single with degrees in engineering such as electrical, mechanical or radio. Undergraduates are permitted to remain in college until their degree is received. Postgraduate scholarships are being offered in a variety of subjects leading to appointments as naval officers.

Lieut. Hutchens will also interview young medical school graduates interested in commissions in the medical corps.

LABOR FEDERATION COMMITTEES EYE RESOLUTION GRIST

Convention Hears Portland C. of C. Representative—Cooperation Pledged.

Marshfield, Ore., June 16.—(P) State Federation of Labor committees today considered the more than a score of resolutions which already have been introduced at the annual convention. The resolutions will not reach the floor until later. Delegates last night heard the first Portland Chamber of Commerce representative ever invited to a convention. He was David B. Simpson, chamber director, who lauded Oregon labor's record of no strikes in war industries.

Cooperation Pledged
He also praised the federation for devising and carrying out a round-table plan of settling disputes, and pledged the chamber to meet labor "half-way."

President Paul Gurkse appealed yesterday for speed in completing the session's business, and expressed the hope that the meeting could be completed by Thursday so the delegates and visitors could return to essential work.

He reviewed labor's attitude toward war work, and expressed pride that "Oregon has not lost a day in defense work due to strikes."

Resolutions introduced so far included:

No Pay For Conscience
The proposal that conscientious objectors be treated the same as enemy aliens and deserters, and not be hired at \$2.50 daily, favoring the Brown amendment to the Hatch act, allowing teachers to participate in political activity; favoring two paydays monthly instead of one for state employees; making civil service status mandatory for state, county and municipal employees; asking that the unemployment compensation law be amended to include employ-

ers with a \$150 monthly pay-roll, with one or more employees, and asking that the national A. F. of L. executive board exercise the right to bar jurisdictional disputes.

Would Up Pay
Another would increase the pay of Dell E. Nickerson, of Portland, executive secretary, from \$4,200 to \$4,800 annually, and would increase the secretary's daily maximum expense allowance, when outside of Portland, from \$6 to \$10 daily, and would allow eight cents a mile for his automobile. The same resolution, which requires a two-thirds rollcall vote for passage, would increase the daily pay of executive board members from \$10 to \$15 when on duty.

All members of the federation who have joined the armed services, specifically William J. Perrin, of Oregon City, an executive board member, would be praised in another resolution. This measure pledges "tools and materials which they shall use to bring victory to our banner."

Food Preservation Demonstration Is Set for Wednesday

Miss Marian Farrell, home demonstration agent, will demonstrate the latest approved methods of home food preservation tomorrow June 17, starting at 10 a. m. in the auditorium of the courthouse with canning and drying the topics for discussion during the morning session. At 1:15 Miss Farrell will demonstrate preparation of food for cold storage lockers.

According to Miss Farrell, emphasis will be placed on making storage lockers perform to fullest capacity. "Many people use their lockers principally for the storage of meats and are unaware that a good portion of their families' food supply may also be frozen at no extra cost," she declared. "Much of the success of freezing vegetables rests in the blanching and preparation for the locker."

The public is invited to attend the meeting. A covered dish luncheon will be served at noon. Each person planning to have luncheon is asked to bring her own table service.

San Francisco, June 16.—(P)—Army pilots at Mills Field today hailed Second Lieut. James H. Mitchell, Cleveland, O., as a hero.

Lieut. Mitchell, they said, deliberately crashed his fighter plane yesterday to avoid hitting 200 men in a hangar. As it was, the plane crashed into one side of the big building, killed Mitchell and an enlisted man on the ground and set fire to the hangar.
