Pollees Opine Golf Tourney Should Continue

Esquire's sports poll for July deals exclusively with golf, and consistent with the votes for war-time continuance of sports in previous polls is the fact that 69.9 per cent of the balloters in this latest poll felt that the national open and national amateur should not have been called off this year.

Match play, in the opinion of 50.97 per cent of the voters, is superior to medal play in determining true individual golf superiority, and 66.38 per cent voted that a war-time golf ball of shorter distance would not reduce their pleasure in playing.

Practice was deemed by 21.28 per cent of the balloters as the most important single factor in the development of a good golf swing, and 50.75 per cent voted that playing at a stop-and-sock place, without supervised instruction, is harmful to a golfer.

Golf presents more opportunities for creating good business contacts than any other sport, in the opinion of 77.36 per cent of the Esquire balloters.

To the question: "What well-executed shot on the links gives you the most pleasure?" the approach led with 49.67 per cent, the drive was next with 32.77 per cent and the putt last with 17.55 per cent.

Both arms, in the opinion of 44.86 per cent of the voters, predominate in the proper golf swing, though 44.58 per cent believed the left arm predominated and 10.56 per cent the right arm.

A wide variety of answers were received on the question detailing the start of the swing. The highest total of 24.08 per cent favored the theory of "just swinging freely without thinking of anything in particular," but 23.79 per cent thought the club should be swung along the line of play.

A total of 89.23 per cent believed that value to a golf game could be learned by watching star golfers in tournaments, 55.66 per cent believed that the same could be accomplished by studying moving pictures of golf stars in action, and 70.19 per cent placed their stamp of approval on reading books about golf.

Currently deadlocked for first place with the Klamath Falls Pelicans, each club having won six and lost two games, the Craters can take over the undisputed loop leadership by whacking the Merchants, who have failed to capture a game in eight starts.

Manager Dutch Lieber of the locals was undecided today which pitcher he would send against the visitors, but it was believed that Steve Crippen was the logical choice. Crippen, who has won four straight, worked against Dorris last Saturday night, while Lieber and Wimer divided the mound chores in the Sunday game.

Two New Players

Grants Pass, which has been strengthened by the acquisition of Bob Normyle of Glendale and George Hagedorn of the State league Silverton Red Sox, is expected to have either Rusty Martindale or Bob Greninger on the rubber. The former is a southpaw.

The Craters are expected to take the field with either Hal Adams or Glen Swanson catching, Lieber or Crippen on first, John Gitzen on second, Norm Worthley on short, Jack Swarthy on third, Dwight Cathwood in left, Al Wray Lightner in center and Don Madden in right.

The game was originally scheduled for next Saturday night, but was moved to tonight to make way for the invasion next week-end of the San Francisco Bear Photos for a two-game series Saturday night and Sunday afternoon.

Warmy Misses 16-Foot Vault As Big Ten Beats Coasters

Evanston, Ill., June 17.—(AP)—Big Ten athletes upset their Pacific coast foes last night to break for the first time the track mastery the westerners have enjoyed in the six years the two conferences have been meeting.

Fresh from dominating the national intercollegiate meet at Lincoln, Neb., the best coast boys could do was capture first places in six of the 15 events with Southern California, the N.C.A.A. champion, winning two of them.

The point totals were 69-23 to 57-13 in favor of the Big Ten, which never before had come within 24 points of winning. The Big Ten took all three places in the discus throw while the coast stars slammed the shotput event.

There were two double winners. California's Hal Davis won the 100-yard dash in 9.5 and the 220 in 20.4, both new meet records, and Ohio State's Bob Wright took both hurdles. He set a record of 14 seconds flat in the 120-yard high. Other records were not threatened.

Only one of the meet's three exhibition performances was successful, Dwight Eddleman, Centralia, Ill., prep high jumper, cleared 6 feet, 6 inches, two inches above the collegians' best. The Great Lakes naval training station mile relay team finished last as the coast quartet won, and Cornelius Warmerdam failed in three attempts to clear 15 feet in the pole vault.

Suffering from a twisted left ankle suffered in a New York charity show Sunday, Warmerdam had to settle for a 14-foot, 2-inch performance.

Slaughter's Homer Gives St. Louis 4-3 Win Over Giants—Red Sox Torrid.

The way the pats on the back are bouncing around the Flat-bush side of the East river these days, no one seems to realize that the Dodgers may be in a fight for that pennant yet. But just in case it's been overlooked over there, the St. Louis Cardinals are on the prowl. And with six wins in a row and 14 out of their last 17, they are strictly not an outfit to be brushed off like a blonde hair on your coat lapel.

At any rate, the season's first "crooshul" series is cooking up to start Thursday, when the used-to-be gas housers wheel their circus into Ebbets field. At this writing, the Cards are just 4½ games away, having disposed of the Giants 4-3 yesterday on the strength of Enos Slaughter's tenth-inning homer.

And, taking another chunk out of the same steak, it might be pointed out that the Red Sox, over in the American league, also can still make trouble, even if the New York Yankees are bouncing along on a nine-game lead after splitting their five-hour twin bill with Detroit yesterday. For, the Red Sox, sparked by Lefty Judd's six-hit curving, knocked off the bewildered Brownies from St. Louis 4-2 last night to run their winning streak to nine—count 'em—in a row.

Yanks Divide

Over in the American league, the Yanks and Tigers put on something new—starting a double header in Detroit at 3 p. m. The Bronx boys blew the first game 7-6 on Rudy York's 14th homer of the year and Jimmy Bloodworth's eighth. And they were on the way to kicking the after-piece away when the Detroiters loaded the bases on Hank Borowy in the ninth inning. But Fireman Johnny Murphy arrived with his hook-and-ladder curve as usual to save a 5-3 decision and keep Borowy among the season's undefeated elbowers with five wins.

SPORTSMEN WILL MEET TONIGHT TO PLAN FIRE HELP

Members of the Rogue River Sportsmen's club and all interested sportsmen of the valley are reminded of the meeting in the chamber of commerce tonight at 7:30. The main purpose of this meeting will be to work out a program with the Rogue River National Forest whereby sportsmen will be able to help during the coming fire season if an emergency should develop in our national forest.

It has been indicated that an emergency is possible, and in such case, it may become necessary for many civilians to assist the forest service. Sportsmen will be given a definite place in this program if they are willing to help.

An official from the office of the Rogue River National Forest will be present at the meeting and will explain the various features of the plan as well as the various rules which the public will have to observe in the use of the national forests this summer.

At this meeting directors will be elected and plans made for giving support to the "Coastal Streams Bill" which was passed during the last session of the legislature and which is being opposed by the commercial fishing interests under a referendum to the people.

All sportsmen are earnestly urged to attend since it will give everyone interested in conservation a real opportunity to make a contribution to the program of fire protection and prevention. It is planned that a field trip will be taken in the near future, at which time explanation will be given of various phases of the program.

STANFORD MENTOR LEAVES FOR NAVY

San Francisco, June 17.—(AP)—James Lawson, Stanford's head football coach, gave up his position today without ever seeing his team win a game.

Commissioned a lieutenant, senior grade, he left for Annapolis to become an instructor in the physical education department.

Lawson, assistant coach at Stanford for many years, was named head coach early this year to succeed Clark Shaughnessy. It was the big break he had waited for, but he was head coach only through spring practice, never in the playing season.

GOLFERS WIND UP TOURNAMENT DRILLS

Chicago, June 17.—(AP)—The easy Ridgemoor club course got a final preliminary going-over today as the nation's golf stars completed their practice for the 72-hole Hfie America benefit tournament starting tomorrow.

From early morning to dusk the more than 100 selected linksmen were scheduled to dissect the 6519-yard layout in preparation for the four-day tournament. All, incidentally, will go the full distance, with no reduction of the field at the half way point as is customary in medal tournaments.

NO NEW RADIO PERMITS WHILE WAR CONTINUES

Washington, June 17.—(AP)—The Federal Communications commission cleared its docket today of applications for constructing or expanding broadcast stations by the dismissal without prejudice of 22 applications for new standard broadcast stations, 17 applications for new frequency modulation stations, and nine applications for increases to 500 kilowatts power.

A commission spokesman said that this removed from the file all such applications which had no opportunity of being granted for the duration of the war. However, they may be reinstated after the war.

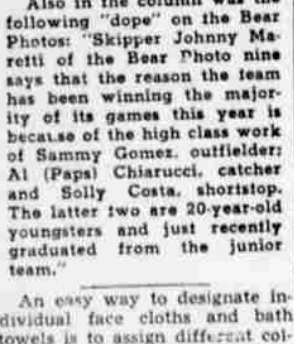
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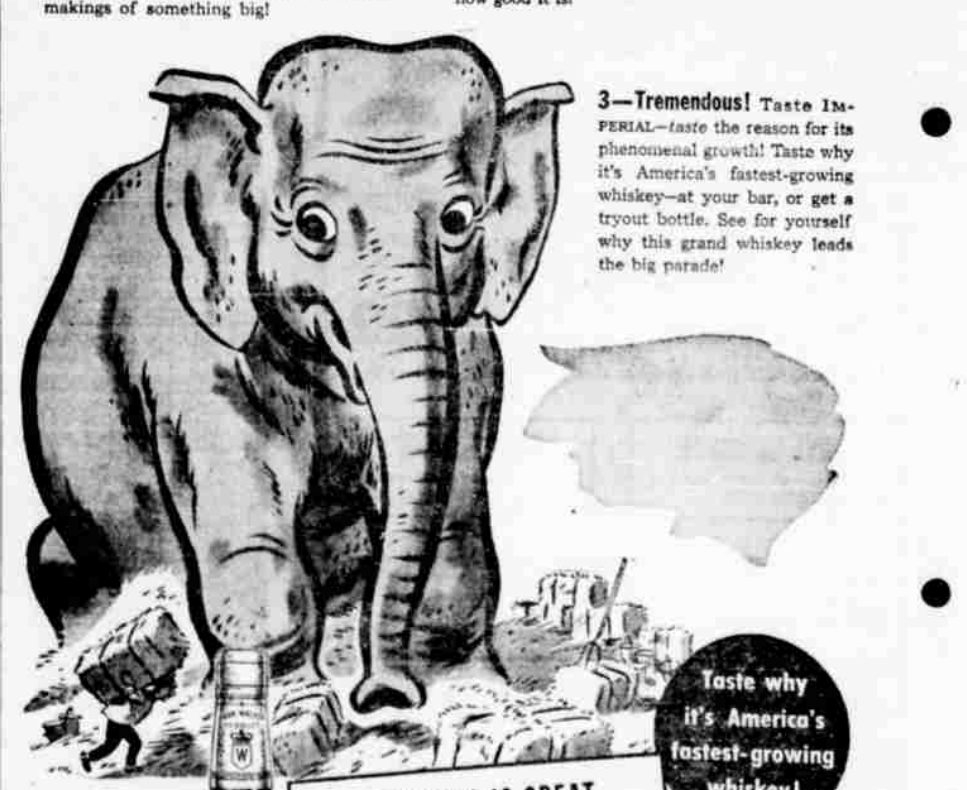
