San Francisco, June 18.—(AP)—Delegates to the International Newspaper Circulation Managers' convention today weighed the words of California's attorney general, Earl Warren, that no other "industry or profession is at present exercising more self discipline or making greater sacrifices for the common good."

Warren spoke at the annual banquet, high point of the meeting, last night. "Freedom of the press will be preserved as long as the people are kept adequately and clearly informed on public questions," he declared in describing an unhampered press as an essential part of democracy.

\$800 IS AWARDED FOR CRASH INJURY

A circuit court jury yesterday afternoon returned a verdict awarding Goldie Snyder, musical instrument saleswoman of Ashland, \$800 judgment in her suit against H. L. Glem and his wife, for personal injury damages assertedly received in an auto accident last July at the Ashland Mine road and Pacific highway intersection near the Ashland northern city limits.

The plaintiff sought \$5,000 general damages and \$900 special damages. The trial lasted nearly three days.

The title goes to the oldest woman attending the reunion. Membership in the association is limited to those born or arriving in the Oregon country before statehood in 1859.

Blaze Destroys Bieber Sawmill

Bieber, Calif., June 18.—(AP)—Fire destroyed the Davis Creek Lumber company mill, eight miles northwest of Bieber last night and A. Zamboni, one of the mill owners, estimated damage at \$100,000.

Four million feet of lumber stored in the mill yards was saved. Most of the damage is covered by insurance, but the mill can't be replaced for operation this year, Zamboni said.

Ceilings Fixed for Red Cedar Shingles Effective June 29

Washington, June 18.—(AP)—The Office of Price administration has fixed the specific ceiling prices on red cedar shingles, which represent about 95 per cent of all wood shingles in this country.

The schedule is effective June

29 and applies to mill shipments. Except for lower grade shingles it pegs prices at approximately the levels which prevailed under the general maximum price ceiling.

No. 1 grade shingle maximums are the same as the average March ceiling prices while the ceiling for the two other grades is somewhat lower. Canadian imports also are subject to the price ceilings.

At the same time, OPA amended its Douglas fir price

ceilings and extended its provisions to cover west coast hemlock and all species of true fir, which previously were subject to the general maximum regulation fixing prices at highest March levels.

Under the extension, the ceilings are substantially below current levels.
