

DEATH SENTENCE FOR POWER FIRMS SEEN IN CPA BILL

Congressional Committee Told Legislation Would Wipe Out Private Owners.

Washington, June 18.—(AP)—Sharp criticism of legislation to set up a Columbia power authority to take over private utilities in Washington and Oregon came today from Kingsey M. Robinson, Spokane, president of the Washington Water Power company.

He told a joint congressional committee that the legislation would "wipe out every private distributor of electricity" in the Pacific northwest "regardless of the will of the people or rates being charged by the private company."

Robinson opposed the Smith-Bone bills (SA2430 and HR6890) to empower such a federal authority to acquire private power companies in the two states and resell their facilities to public bodies for distribution of energy generated at the Bonneville and Grand Coulee dams on the Columbia river.

The power company executive said that 90 per cent of the revenue of his company and over 81 per cent of its population were in areas where public ownership had been defeated or where no elections had been held.

He also said the city of Spokane, served by his company, used two and a half times as much electricity as the average for the country and paid for it nearly 25 per cent less than the average rate of similar service in the Tennessee Valley Authority region.

Senator Bone (D-Wash.), co-author of the bills, asked how the Spokane rate compared with that in Tacoma, which has publicly owned power.

Tacoma Cited Robinson replied Tacoma's rate was 1.2 cents a kilowatt hour compared with 1.5 cents in Spokane, but he added Tacoma

was particularly benefited by ample water supply. He observed, however, that Spokane's rate of growth had been greater than Tacoma's.

Robinson assailed a federal condemnation provision in the bills under which, he explained, a public power agency could take over property of a private company by filing a declaration of intent in federal court and deposit with the court funds to cover an appraised value of the property.

"Under this proposal the administrator would only have to decide that he wanted a particular electric company out of business and he could start condemnation proceedings even though a large majority of the people in the area were not interested in purchasing the distribution system from him," Robinson asserted.

"Even though Spokane did not want municipal ownership the properties could be sold to the Spokane county public utility district, an REA cooperative, or a new type of cooperative or non-profit corporation that might be formed by a few job-hungry power politicians."

"The properties of one city could be sold to another, rural areas put under city control or vice versa, all in the sole discretion of the administration without let or hindrance of the wishes of the people."

Facts Dispute Claim Replying to a contention that unification of private companies with public power was necessary in the interest of prosecuting the war, Robinson said the facts did not bear out this conclusion.

"With the interconnections now being made and others contemplated every kilowatt-hour of energy in the area that can be made useful will be conserved for the war effort," he declared.

"No new group can take these generating plants and water storage facilities and get the amount of capacity and energy out of them that the group now operating them are getting."
