

SPORTSMEN WILL VOLUNTEER FOR FIRE FIGHTING

Rogue River Club Pledges
Cooperation With Forest
Service—Class June 28.

The Rogue River Sportsmen's club, meeting in the chamber of commerce last night, pledged itself to cooperate with the Rogue River National Forest in its program to create a volunteer fire-fighting reserve among business men for use in case of an emergency the coming summer.

Volunteers will be recruited from the club's membership list and, under the direction of forest service fire wardens, will spend a half day in the woods Sunday, June 28, learning practical methods of fighting forest fires. Volunteers will leave the chamber of commerce at 11 a. m. on that date, in trucks furnished by the forest service, and all those desiring to volunteer are asked to contact Ken Denman,

Leaders Speak

Speakers at the meeting included Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue River National Forest; H. P. Gaylord, assistant supervisor of the Grand Mesa Forest in Colorado, who will spend the summer here on a special fire-fighting assignment, and M. L. Tedrow, fire warden of the Rogue River National Forest, who explained the volunteer fire-fighting reserve program to club members.

Also speaking was L. H. Douglas, assistant regional forester from Portland, who described the mule deer and elk situation in eastern Oregon.

The club endorsed 100 per cent the "Coastal Streams Fishing Bill," which will be on the November election ballot as a referendum, and voted to contribute \$100 of the club's funds to the Oregon Wildlife federation use in the federation's campaign in support of the bill.

Five directors were elected for one-year terms. They were Karl L. Janouch, H. H. Pringle, Irl Graves, Henry Niedermeyer and Harry Dowson.

Ashland City Budget Reduced \$3,565 for Coming Fiscal Year

Ashland, June 18.—(Spl.) The city council and the Citizens budget committee, after a thorough discussion of the budget for the fiscal year from July 1, 1942 to June 30, 1943, adopted the budget with a reduction of \$3,565 below the original estimate.

As first proposed the budget called for a total of \$46,836, whereas the total finally agreed upon was \$43,271.00.

The main reduction was in the emergency fund, which was reduced \$3,000 from the original estimate of \$8,000.34 to \$5,000.34.

Other reductions were: \$100 in extra fees for attorney, from \$200 to \$100; elimination of \$85 for election expenses; auditor's fees cut from \$400 to \$30; elimination of \$100 for wood and supplies in the relief department, reportedly because it was thought it would be impossible to get wood cutters; fire hall building fund from \$2500 to \$1,500, as this is postponed for the duration.

3 CANADIANS DIE IN PLANE CRASHES

Malone, N. Y., June 18.—(AP)—Deaths in the crash of four Royal Canadian air force planes in northern New York's rugged mountains reached three today with discovery of two additional bodies in a wrecked craft—last to be accounted for.

The victims were identified as D. O. Thompson, a pilot officer whose plane was one of three wrecked on rugged Lake Mountain 15 miles southeast of here, and Val Legacy, warrant officer second class, and a leading aircraftman whose name was given only as Theorette.

Bodies of Legacy and Theorette were located soon after dawn in a crumpled plane on nearby "W" mountain after a 24-hour search.

The planes, each carrying two men, were blown off their course on a training flight early yesterday.

FARM LABOR
