GIFTS OF RUBBER RUN COUNTY PILE TO 105,804 POUNDS

Surpassing any day of the five-day-old nationwide drive for scrap rubber, Thursday's collections in Jackson county amounted to 47,856 pounds to bring the total thus far accumulated by the oil companies to 105,804 pounds, or 32.9 tons, it was reported by R. G. Fowler, chairman of the county salvage committee.

Largest single collection was made from the James L. Ker-shaw dairy, Route 4, which turned in 4,350 pounds, all of it in old tires. Two large donations were made, the Pacific-Portland Cement company of Gold Hill giving 4,000 pounds and Chet Leonard 1,500 pounds, both refusing to accept the one-cent a pound the government is paying for the scrap rubber.

The county stock pile was certain to be increased by 50,000 pounds today, Fowler stated, explaining that the Medford Bargain House, Harry B. Rubenstein and Harry Kaplan, proprietors, planned to turn over 25 tons of scrap rubber to the oil companies.

Fowler said that committees had been appointed for the rural areas to see that all neighborhood pools their scrap rubber and take it to the nearest service station. He added that oil company trucks would pick up any rubber placed by the roadside if it couldn't be delivered to a service station.

ALUMINUM DRIVE DISAPPOINTMENT WPB DISCOVERS

Washington, June 19.—(P)—In the midst of the government's campaign to salvage scrap rubber, war production board officials discovered today that the famous "pots-and-pans" aluminum collection drive last year turned up less than half of the metal they had expected.

For months, it was learned, WPB has been attempting to obtain conclusive and final reports on success or failure of the one-week aluminum campaign last July. Finally, what amounted to an official investigation was undertaken and a complete statistical report prepared.

The report, it was understood, showed that a total of about 11,200,000 pounds of aluminum and other scrap were collected—compared with the 20,000,000 pounds which had been predicted. Of this scrap, only 6,400,000 pounds was in the form of aluminum, contrasted with a 15,000,000 pound forecast.

Of the scrap obtained, about 3,700,000 pounds of aluminum ingot actually has been sold to the RFC Metals Reserve company, for resale to war industries and use in war production.

WPB officials have made no secret of their criticisms of Mayor F. H. La Guardia of New York, then director of the office of civilian defense which handled the pots and pans campaign, for eliminating junk dealers as intermediaries in the aluminum salvaging.

ATLANTIC SINKINGS TOTAL 278 SHIPS

The announced toll of submarine-sunk allied and neutral ships in the western Atlantic since Pearl Harbor stood at 278 today while from Bogota, Colombia, another victim—was reported unofficially.

Latest announced sinkings, which brought to 14—and possibly 15 if the Bogota report was true—the number of merchantmen reported lost this week, were those of a small Norwegian vessel in the Gulf of Mexico, a small Dutch freighter and a small American merchant vessel in the Caribbean.
