Los Angeles Leaders Fear Defense Workers Will Reduce Efforts

Los Angeles, June 19—(AP)—The county defense council fears the morale of its volunteer workers will be impaired by Secretary Stimson's statement that recent Japanese naval setbacks have materially reduced the danger of attacks on the Pacific coast.

Chairman Eugene W. Biscailuz and executive director Harold W. Kennedy wrote Stimson that his assertion "lessening the morale and interest of thousands of air raid wardens, auxiliary policemen, volunteers in the emergency medical service

and other volunteers . . ."

They asked Stimson to clarify his statement "so that he would be in a position to either release these volunteers x x x or attempt to hold their interest and morale to meet any war emergencies until the war has actually been won."
