

San Francisco Bear Photos to Face Craters Twice This Week-End

GAMES SCHEDULED SATURDAY NIGHT, NEXT AFTERNOON

Visitors Boast Several Brilliant Young Players—14 Men Will Make Trip.

Manager Johnny Maretti's Bear Photos of San Francisco, victorious in six out of nine games this season and generally recognized as the number one semi-pro baseball club in the Bay area, will arrive in Medford tomorrow afternoon for a two-game series with the Craters. First tilt will be played Saturday night starting at 9 o'clock and the windup will get under way at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

The Bear Photos' 14-man roster includes some of the most sensational young players in northern California; namely, Sally Costa, 20-year-old shortstop and former Galileo high star; Outfielder Sammy Gomez and Al (Papa) Chiarucci, catcher, another 20-year-old ex-Galileo luminary.

Facing the Craters in the two-game set will be Cookie Pera, for the past five years a leading flier in San Francisco's semi-pro circles, and Bob Perret, who pitched Simmons Mattress company to the Industrial league pennant the past winter. It is not known which games the two hurlers will work.

Kermit Cannon, former University of California star, holds down first base for the Photos; Curly Corona takes care of the keyhole and A. (Blackie) Zepponi operates at the hot corner. In the outfield, besides Gomez, are three brothers who alternate in the other two positions—W. Lucchessi, F. Lucchessi and J. Lucchessi.

Crip May Pitch
Steve Crippen, who has notched four straight Oregon-California league victories, is expected to do the Crater pitching in the Saturday night contest, with either Manager Dutch Lieber or Pvt. Dickinson, the U. S. army right-hander who beat Grants Pass, 12 to 4, Wednesday night with seven hits and 13 strikeouts, laboring on the mound in the Sunday game.

Hal Adams, Glen Swanson or Johnson will be back of the plate Saturday, with Lieber or Al Fleischman, borrowed from Grants Pass, on first base; Johnny Crippen on second, Norm Worthley on short, Harold Lang, Bus Solveter or Jack Swaryck on third, Dwight Catherwood in left, Al Wray Lightner in center and Don Madden in right.

Appearance here of the Bear Photos will be the first of a San Francisco team since the Pacific Greyhounds came to Medford in 1940 to make life miserable for the locals. Largest crowds of the season are expected to see the games.

While the Crater are facing the Photos, Klamath Falls will be playing a two-game Oregon-California league series with the Dorris, (Cal.) Lumberjacks, at Dorris.

ED ERAUTT WILL PLAY FOR SALEM

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CARDS TROUNCED BY BROOKLYN IN RIOTOUS CONTEST

Free-For-All at Second Base Enlivens 5-2 Dodger Victory—Two Chased.

Baseball's fiercest feud in many seasons—the two-year-old rhabarb of the rowdy Brooklyn Dodgers and the scrapping St. Louis Cardinals—has broken out again.

St. Louis came streaming into Ebbets Field last night with a seven-game winning streak and visions of shaving down the Dodgers' 4½ game National league lead during their crucial five-game series.

But the Dodgers diverted the Redbirds' attention with a free-for-all at second base in the sixth inning and sneaked off with a 5-2 victory that eventually may prove one of the most vital of the season.

It was two years to the day from the game in which Joe Medwick was beaned by Bob Bowman of the Cardinals and Medwick set off the newest strife with a high lunging slide into Shortstop Martin Marion. Second Baseman Frank Crispi knocked Medwick down and the players of both squads waded into each other.

Unlike some baseball battles, it was furious while it lasted and several players came out of it with bumps on their heads, skinned faces and other injuries. Dixie Walker of the Dodgers twisted his leg and had to withdraw from the game and both Medwick and Crispi were banished by the umpires.

Cinched In 8th
When it was over lefty Max Lanier was so unsettled he gave up a walk and two singles to let Brooklyn tie the score at 2-2 and had to be replaced by John Beazley to get the final out in the sixth.

The Cards seemed to be still thinking of the skirmish when the Dodgers drove three runs across in the eighth to sew up the game.

The Detroit Tigers tumbled the New York Yankees again 3-1 on the four-hit hurling of Virgil (Fire) Trucks.

Early Wynn's seven-hit pitching and the lusty hitting of his battery-mate, Jake Early, provided the Washington Senators a 7-1 verdict over the Cleveland Indians.

The Chicago White Sox exchanged positions with the Philadelphia Athletics again by winning 7-2 on the five-hit hurling of Buck Ross and Joe Haynes, who worked the last inning. Ross allowed just two hits till the eighth.

Chicago, June 19—(P)—The only thing that possibly could create any excitement in the second round of the Hale America golf tournament today would be for one of the leaders to shoot a 61 and then be disqualified because he was caught using a putter off the tees.

Everything else happened yesterday, leaving the crowds that surged over the Ridgemoor club course somewhat surfeited with under-par golf and sideshow amusements.

Sammy Byrd, the ex-ball player, whose clubs were ruled out as too grooved, played with a borrowed set, so mad he could shoot no better than a par 72.

Jimmy Thomson, known as the longest driver in the business and perhaps the most erratic with his irons, won both the driving and the approaching contests, the latter to his own complete astonishment.

And 63 players of a total entry of 96 either equalled or beat the tar out of Ridgemoor's official par. Seldom has golf seen a shooting match to equal it.

Leading the field at the first turn in the big charity event were Otey Crisman, a pint-size pro from Alabama, and Mike Turnesa, each with a 65.

A score or more of the game's greatest shooters were right on their heels. All the top men were within easy striking distance.

There were five at 67—Lawson Little, Harry Cooper, Lloyd Mangrum, Mike Sipula and Al Brosch. Six were deadlocked at 68—Dick Metz, Herman Baran, Jimmy Demaret, Horton Smith, George Snelmer and Wilford Wehrle, the amateur star.

LIEUT. GENE RAYMOND ARRIVES IN LONDON

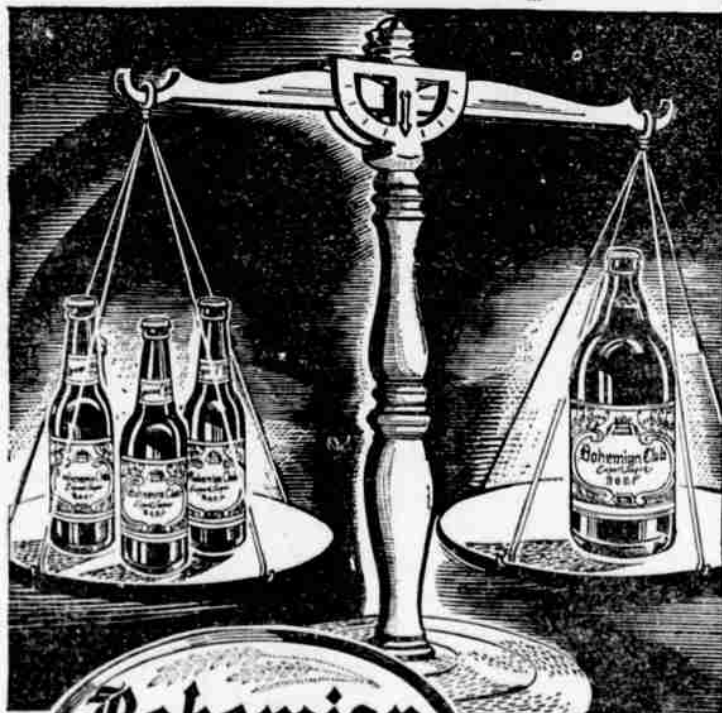
