

EXPANDING ARMY TO START HEAVY PRACTICE JULY 13

Stimson Announces New
Tasks For State Guards—
Army To Give Teachers.

Washington, June 19.—(P)—Four months of intensive war time field maneuvers, stressing desert and jungle fighting and joint operations by air and ground forces, will open for a large portion of the expanding army July 13.

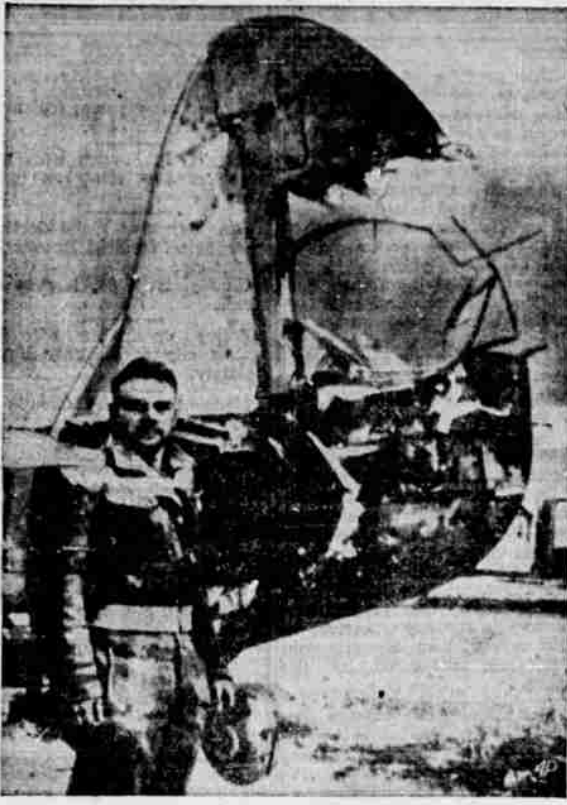
Secretary Stimson announced this schedule today. Six army corps, each of two or more divisions, will undergo the training, in the south and west.

Aimed at providing "the most thorough training ever developed for American troops," the maneuvers will help condition troops "both mentally and physically for the job that lies ahead," the war secretary said.

Work For Guards
Stimson announced at the same time that new tasks had been defined for the state guards formed to take the place of national guard units now in national service.

time instructors to give realistic training, whenever they can be spared, through the commanders of the army's nine corps areas.

A new war department directive said the state guardsmen would be expected to deal with disturbances and disasters, to guard vital facilities, assist military police, suppress enemy agents and cope with parachute troops.

SOLDIERS' RIGHTS ARE SAFEGUARDED BY PROPOSED BILL

House Passes Measure Fore-
stalling Note Foreclos-
ures; Life Insurance Loss.

Washington, June 19.—(P)—Legislation designed to protect the civil rights of service men while they are in the armed forces was passed unanimously today by the house and sent to the senate.

A highly technical measure, it won house approval after brief debate and an explanation by Representative Sparkman (D-Ala.) that its primary purpose was to "give relief to the boy who is called into service" and to afford him a "reasonable time" in which to adjust his financial position after his return to civilian life.

The bill provides for suspension, generally in the discretion of a court, of many civil processes normally applicable in cases involving installment payments, foreclosures, rentals and other financial obligations.

Saves Insurance
Under its provisions the government guarantees the payment of premiums on private life insurance policies purchased four years after his discharge to liquidate the premiums that have accumulated in his absence.

It relieves a service man of liability for payments under leases after he is called into the service, and, limits to six per cent the interest rate that may be charged on an obligation incurred prior to entering the service, regardless of whether higher rates were agreed in the original contract.
