Brooklyn, June 20.—(AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers took care of whatever was crucial about their series with the second place Cardinals today, pounding the St. Louis club into submission, 10 to 4, for their third successive victory over Billy Southworth's men.

The Cards came into Ebbets field two days ago riding high on a seven-game winning streak and with high hopes of cutting into the National league leaders, pace-setting margin. After dropping two close ones and then seeing four of their pitchers walked for 15 hits today, the Redbirds found themselves trailing by seven and one-half games and the Dodgers enjoying their biggest advantage of the season. The Angel pitcher wasn't around at the finish, however. San Francisco chased him to the showers with a belated five-run spurge in the eighth frame.

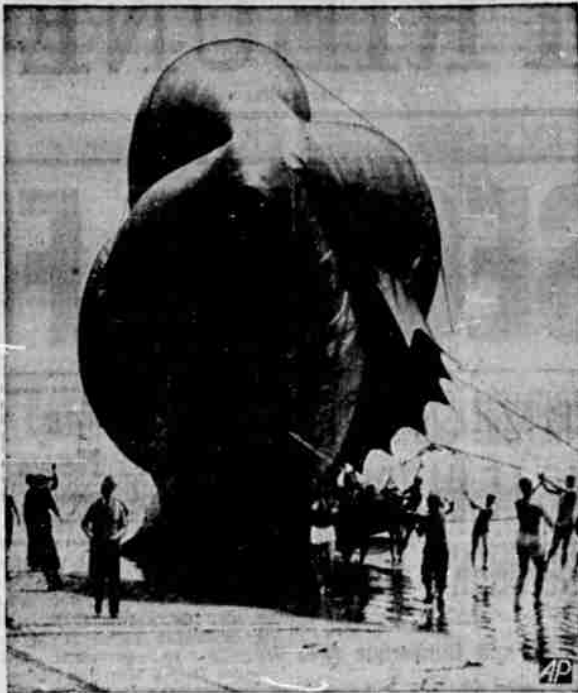

# BEAR PHOTO AGE HURLER TO FACE CRATERS AT 2:30

Bob Perret, 26-year-old right-hander and a star of Bay area winter league diamond circles, will hurl for the San Francisco Bear Photos when they clash with the Craters at the fairgrounds park this afternoon in the second game of their two-game series. The tilt will start at 2:30 sharp.

Perret, ace of the Bear Photos mound staff, captured nine straight games in San Francisco winter league action. He won five in a row to pitch Simmons Matress company to the Industrial league pennant and then notched four consecutive wins for the Bear Photos in the Recreation loop. This spring, with the Photos playing independent ball, Perret has won three and lost two, beating the naval air base, 15 to 5; Scotia, 9 to 0 and Ft. Bragg, 5 to 2. He dropped a 3 to 1 decision to Tiburon, although yielding only three hits, and was beaten by the Mare Island Marines, 5 to 2.

Cleveland, June 20.—(AP)—Throttled by Lefty Al Smith's one-hit pitching, the pace-setting New York Yankees dropped their fourth straight game and their fifth in their last six outings today as the Cleveland Indians took a 1 to 0 pitching duel.

Smith, who stopped Ernie Bonham's string of pitching victories at eight games recently, again outpointed the Yankee right hander with the Indians pushing over the lone run of the game in the seventh on successive singles by Ken Keltner, Les Fleming and Buster Mills.

Joe Di Maggio, whose 56-game hitting streak was broken last year by the combined pitching of Smith and Jim Bagby, got the only hit off the Indians' southpaw—a double in the second inning. Di Maggio and Buddy Hassett, safe on Smith's error in the seventh, were the only Yankees to get on base as Smith didn't issue a pass. He fanned five.

# VALDINA ORPHAN DEFEATS SHUTOUT IN RECORD TIME

Surprise Victory Scored by  
Two Lengths by Texas  
Horse.

New York, June 20.—(AP)—The three year old racing situation became as scrambled as a platter of boarding house hash again today when Shut Out was soundly beaten in the Dwyer stakes by the Texas filer, Valdina Orphan, in one of the fastest mile and a quarter races ever run.

Victor over Alsab in the Kentucky Derby and Belmont stakes, and generally conceded to have a strange hold on the championship of three year olds, Mrs. Payne Whitney's chocolate colt came from last place today to run second—but he couldn't do a thing to catch Emerson Woodward's high speed Galloper over Aqueduct's lightning-fast layout.

For, with a crowd of 23,833 looking on in amazement after backing the son of Equipoise down to 13-to-20 in the betting, "The Orphan" led from end to end under Jockey Carroll Bierman's blistering ride to hit the wire in 2:01 2-5 in the 54th running of this ancient grind.

And in disproving the theory that he couldn't run that far, even with an outboard motor, the pride of the Valdina farms stables posted a mark that has been bettered only rarely in racing history.

The 1:59 4-5 St. Andrews II chalked up at Brighton, England, three years ago, stands as the tops for the 10 furlongs.

At the finish, it was the Orphan by two lengths to pick up the \$21,150 pot of gold. Shut Out was \$2.40 for place, and Lochinvar, who ran third, eight lengths farther back, was \$2.40 for show. The rest of the field of six ran so far back they didn't resemble horses in the distance.
