

Barbara Stanwyck In "The Great Man's Lady", New Picture At Craterian

THREE STARS IN OUTDOOR ACTION PIONEER STORY

Any movie fan will admit that three stars in a picture are better than one, and when the three stars concerned are such vital folk as Barbara Stanwyck, Joel McCrea and Brian Donlevy, their picture is bound to be heralded as one of Hollywood's major treats.

"The Great Man's Lady," which comes today to the Craterian theatre for a three-day run, finds the three luminaries who appeared together so successfully in Cecil B. DeMille's "Union Pacific." This time, as then, their roles are played against the exciting background of America in the making. EARLY CURE FOR DIABETES NEARS PHYSICIANS TOLD

Portland, June 20—(AP)—The medical profession soon may be able to prevent and cure diabetes, Dr. Jerome W. Conn, Ann Arbor, Mich., told the Pacific Northwest Medical association convention today.

Recent results from experimental laboratories provide new insight into the factors which initiate the diabetic state and finally result in destruction of the insulin-producing cells in the pancreas, he said.

"By knowing what these factors are," Conn said, "physicians may in the future be able to give treatment which will prevent the disease, and with increasing knowledge gained by experimentation, actual cure of already established cases is not impossible."
