

Craig And Mihalikis Meet In "Grudge" Wrestling Match Tonight

RETURN STRUGGLE EXPECTED TO BE WILD AND BITTER

McDonald and Thunderbird In Middle Event—Olsen and Corral Will Open.

George Craig, pride and joy of Camp White, gets his chance for sweet revenge in the armory tonight when he clashes with Prince Selaki Mihalikis in the main event of Promoter Mack Lillard's weekly wrestling card.

Rematched after their brawl of last week, at the red-hot demands of Craig's many cantonment friends and Craig, himself, the pair are expected to stage one of the most furious battles of the year.

Promoter Mack Lillard said today the advance ticket sale was the best since wrestling was resumed here in February, indicating a near capacity crowd. The program gets under way at 8:30 sharp.

Craig is filled with bitterness over the outcome of his last match with Mihalikis, a match that saw the Prince extend the hand of purported friendship as a blind to an unsportsmanlike trick that won him the verdict. Craig is determined to get even with Mihalikis, and probably won't be too particular how he does it.

Sockeye Jack McDonald and Chief Thunderbird, who put on a fine match last week, will meet again, this time in the six-round semi-windup. McDonald was the victor, two falls to one, in their first tussle, and hopes to run his win-string to three tonight. Cliff Olsen and Alberto Corral will open the program in a four-round duel. Olsen is slightly off-color in his tactics.

BENNY HOGAN IS VICTOR IN HALE AMERICA TOURNEY

Brilliant 271 Is 10 Strokes Under "Open" Record—Jimmy Demaret Fades.

Chicago, June 22—(P)—Little Ben Hogan, some 135 pounds of pure whiplash, finally crashed through to win that major golf championship which eluded him so long while he was busy winning most of the money and otherwise establishing himself as the uncrowned king of the links.

His victory in the Hale America tournament which ended yesterday at the Ridgemoor club was about as brilliant a feat as golf has seen. His total of 271 for the 72 holes shattered by 10 strokes the record for national open championship. On his second round the dark, diminutive ex-Texan shot an almost unbelievable 62.

Yet, ironically, the supreme goal of every golfer still eludes Ben. His name will not appear in golf's record book as winner of the national open title. Because of the war, there will be no open tournament this year.

This was the closest thing to it. Hogan, though, was not in a mood to accept any sympathy after he had rolled in putts from all sort of distances to score his clinching 68 yesterday.

Ben was the winner, the player who pocketed first prize of \$1,100. The "goat" of the four-day event—and there seems to be one in every tournament—was Jimmy Demaret, of Detroit. The happy-go-lucky Jimmy needed only to shoot the last four holes in par to score a 66 on his final round and finish in a tie with Hogan for the title. Instead, he went to pieces, drove like the rankest duffer on three consecutive holes and wound up in a tie with Mike Turnesa for second place with a total of 274.

CRATERS TROUNCE PHOTOS, 12 TO 1 TO SWEEP SERIES

With Pvt. Joe Dickinson of the U. S. army flinging a three-hit masterpiece, the Medford Craters walloped San Francisco's Bear Photos, 12 to 1 here yesterday to sweep the two-game series between the two clubs. The Craters captured the Saturday night affair, 14 to 12.

Dickinson, who last year played in the American Association and the Three-Eye league, completely handcuffed the Californians with his blazing fast ball and razor-edge curve. One of the Photo hits was a "bleeder" into left field and their lone run was unearned. It came in the fourth inning when J. Luchessi singled to right but was forced at second as Don Madden, after dropping Costa's fly, recovered in time to get Luchessi at the keystone. Costa then stole second and continued to third on Catcher John Johnson's bad throw, and scored on a passed ball.

That run put the Photos in front 1 to 0 and with Cookie Pera, Photo righthander, mowing down the Craters in capable fashion the tally looked bigger and bigger. But in the sixth inning all Hades broke loose, and when the locals were through exploding Pera was out of the game and nine runs were in. That clinched the game but just to make certain the Craters whaled three more across in the seventh off Bob Perret, who relieved Pera.

Here is the way that terrific sixth inning went for the Craters: with one out, Catherwood got life on Costa's bad throw to first and Manager Dutch Lieber singled through third. Don Madden singled through the middle scoring Catherwood and John Gitzon walked, filling the bases. Johnson singled to left and all three men scored when Gomes let the ball roll through his legs. Dickinson singled Johnson home and Jack Swaryck tripled to deep right-center scoring Dickinson. Worthley walked and out came Pera. Al Wray greeted Perret with a single scoring Swaryck, and Worthley tallied while Catherwood was grounding out. Lieber got his second hit of the

inning, a scratcher to shortstop, and Wray scored on Madden's second single of the frame. Gitzon forced Madden to end the wild stanza.

Fourteen Craters batted during the game-winning rally. Although they certainly didn't need any more runs, the locals made it 12 to 1 in the seventh on Johnson's single to center, Dickinson's sacrifice, Swaryck's infield blow, a fielder's choice and Wray's triple to left.

Saturday night's game was a fantastic affair, with the Craters pounding Pera out of the box in the first inning when they scored 10 runs, the Photos chopping away until they went ahead, 12 to 10, and the locals finally getting three more runs in the fifth and one in the seventh to win.

In the first inning, with the bases loaded, Al Wray blasted the first homer of the year in the fairgrounds park, a tremendous clout over the left field wall. The Craters used four pitchers—Steve Crippen, Lieber, Al Wimer and Dickinson—with Lieber getting credit for the victory although Dickinson had to come to his rescue with a scoreless four-inning stint.
