

UNIQUE STRUCTURE OF SWISS PATTERN BLENDS WITH AREA

A new Chalet has just been completed at the Oregon Caves, which was started October 1, at the close of the 1941 season. This is a much larger building than the former, which was constructed in 1923 as the first building in the Oregon Caves National Monument.

The two upper floors contain quarters for 40 persons and are occupied by the college girls employed during the summer months. The ground floor has the guide service registration office, dressing rooms, store and souvenir shop, waiting room and children's nursery.

The building is of Swiss style or architecture similar to the Chateau and the outside is finished with Port Orford cedar bark, which makes it blend with surrounding area. It is steam heated throughout.

The Oregon Caves company is endeavoring to provide the same excellence of service as in the past and unless further restrictions are made on travel all of the facilities will be open throughout the summer season. Early season travel has only been slightly under a year ago.

The resort opened officially on May 29, making available room accommodations in the Chateau and hotel cottages, meal service in the coffee shop and regularly scheduled trips at frequent intervals through the caves.

THIRD SPRAY FOR MOTHS DUE SOON

The third cover spray for control of codling moth on apples and pears should be completed June 30, according to L. G. Gentner, entomologist Southern Oregon Experiment station, and C. B. Cordy, assistant county agent.

The assistant agent advises use of 1/4 pound Colloidol 77, 3 pounds of arsenate of lead and one quart of stove oil per 100 gallons. Add to the tank in the order listed with the agitator running. For asstringent lead use 1/4 pound of Multi-film instead of Colloidol 77.

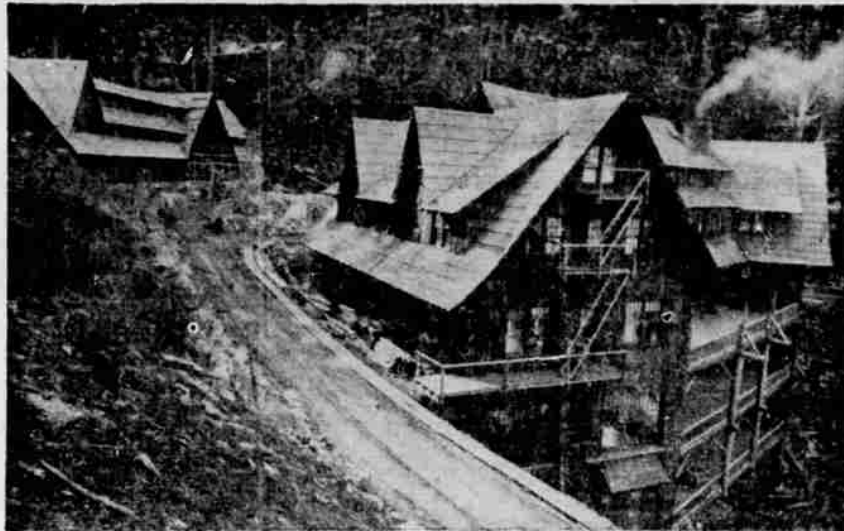

SMALL FIRE NEAR PARK'S EAST LINE

Rogue River National Forest headquarters reported today a small fire, covering a little more than one acre just east of the Crater Lake National Park boundary near The Dalles-California highway, was controlled at 8:45 p. m. Sunday after having been discovered at 6:20 p. m.

Forest headquarters said the blaze, evidently caused by a smoker, was in a cut-over area heavy with slashings. It was first reported by an Indian service lookout. The Indian service sent one man to the fire and the forest service dispatched a crew, which was mopping up today.
