58TH VARIETY TO BE PLANE PART

Pittsburgh, June 22—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—The H. J. Heinz Company, whose business normally is canning foods, reported today "large-scale" production of airplane parts from plastic bonded plywood will soon be started in some of its plants.

The company said a study of its factories showed that some of the equipment was "adaptable" immediately to specialized work—particularly the manufacture of plywood aircraft parts.

"Specific details of the project cannot be disclosed but large-scale production soon will be realized," the firm added.
