

MILK POOL FOR CAMP WHITE IS BOARD'S ORDER

Jackson and Josephine County Producers To Participate—To Sign Forms.

Jackson and Josephine counties have been designated as a milk production area for Camp White military supply under an order setting up a milk pool, issued by the state milk control board.

The pool assumes control over all milk produced in the area except that produced for normal civilian bottle and can trade, and provides means for changing the percentage allotted to civilian supply.

Any person who wishes to qualify as a producer may do so by filling out forms supplied by the control board. Any producer within the area "who was on July 1, 1942, producing fluid milk for the civilian marketing channels of any market under the jurisdiction of the board, and who also desires to produce fluid milk for . . . Camp White sales area may qualify as a producer for the military pool except that any quota allocated to such existing producer in the military pool shall be based upon the excess of his production over and above his civilian market quota as of the last day of the month preceding his qualification for the military pool."

Change Permitted
A producer may change the percentage of supply he allots to the civilian and military markets hereafter on October 1 and April 1 of each year.

If a producer signs up to supply the military pool and fails to do so, he shall be penalized unless the board rules otherwise.

When and if the producer cannot supply enough milk for the military pool, then the pool may buy milk from any market within the state.

Producers not now serving civilian markets shall be allocated a quota based on a daily production of three-fourths of a pound butterfat for each cow milking as of July 1, 1942, or thereafter on the date of qualification and approval. But the control board may change quotas at any time.

ed a contract to furnish the requirement of any governmental agency located within the sales area "shall be required to purchase all of his requirements from the military pool."

Minimum Set
The minimum price to be paid by dealers for milk received and used as milk and or cream in the bottle and can trade in the area shall be 76c per pound butterfat f.o.b. dealer's plant. The present price for civilian markets is 67c, the additional costs to meet military requirements.

A basic military pool is set up, and from its receipts the control board's administrative expenses will be deducted, as well as transportation charges from one milk dealer's plant to another. The payment to producers will be on the percentage of pounds of butterfat.

In addition, a surplus military pool is established, consisting of sales of milk "in excess of the delivered quota." The funds shall be similarly divided.

The state milk control board administrator is named administrator of the pool.

Monthly pooling periods will be established beginning the first day of August.

If the producers who sign up for the pool cannot meet the requirements, then the board may require other producers or producers' marketing agents to sell to the pool all the supplies beyond that required for the bottle and can trade used in civilian marketing channels.

BRITISH STUNNED BY NAZIS' SPEED IN TOBRUK ATTACK

Defenders Unable To Offer Real Resistance Because of Swift German Drive.

Cairo, Egypt, June 23.—(P)—The German attack on Tobruk was a lightning blow that reduced the Libyan stronghold with such rapidity that it stunned the British defenders.

Many of them never had a chance to offer any real resistance whatever.

Details of the British debacle, which can now be told for the first time, show that the operation against Tobruk was one of the swiftest blows yet delivered in this war of speed and surprises.

Once having smashed through the perimeter of the port's outer defenses, Marshal Rommel's tanks made straight for the waterfront.

Tanks vs. Warcraft
Standing at the water's edge they put British minesweepers, trawlers, tank-carrying barges and smaller craft under immediate fire.

Then the Germans brought up heavy guns to add to the barrage. Some of the ships at the waterfront returned the fire, and the battle raged between tanks and cannon on one side and ships on the other.

The Germans had the advantage since, as far as is known, there were no heavy British vessels such as cruisers and destroyers in port.

Some of the ships got away, taking off 200 naval ratings, but first reports indicate few if any of the army personnel escaped.

Gen. Wavell's army took Tobruk in February, 1940, capturing 30,000 Italians there in a day and a half. That was considered a swift and brilliant feat.

But the Germans appeared to have beaten this record by many hours.

Tobruk's fortifications are such that once its 30-mile perimeter of barbed wire mine fields, tank traps and pill boxes is broken, it does not take long to reduce the entire stronghold because the perimeter defenses can be rolled back from inside.

superiority, they bombed his thin supply lines running back in the lanes through the mine fields.

This should have won for them, but they then encountered

ed too much weather. The crafty nazis used every kind of vehicle which would haul water or gas, and his troops went for long stretches without water.

British soldiers, escaped from German prison camps, said that they had gone 48 hours without water, and when they complained, Rommel's officers asserted they had had no water for 48 hours either.

A sandstorm came up and Rommel's caravans were able to slip through unobserved by British planes.

If you want a good technical excuse, you may find it in the German 88 millimeter anti-tank and anti-aircraft gun. Most of the tanks in the fight were British. The relatively small number of our General Grants performed well according to all accounts.

But Rommel used his superior gun on self-propelled and towed mounts to devastating effect. That dual purpose gun has an extremely high muzzle velocity and is highly respected.

When Rommel retreated the first time he concentrated them in narrow defiles in which he trapped many a British tank.

FOR another thing, Rommel used his planes in close support of his tanks, while the British let the tanks go alone and used their planes mainly to bomb Rommel's supply lines (although this is a choice most generals would have made).

Despite Rommel's victory, he has lost a lot of tanks and there is every reason to hope he cannot go on into Egypt to break the grasp of the United Nations on the middle east before fall—and things may be different for our side there by fall. If he can find more soft spots, he might try to crash through, but the British are apparently not demoralized.

A GLANCE at the map will show you Hitler is attacking points farthest from American aid. Our supplies have been going into Russia at Murmansk, the northern tip of the transcontinental battle line, while Hitler is picking on the southern extremity. We are getting supplies into Egypt but mostly the long way around the Cape of Good Hope.

This would be an ideal subject for a Roosevelt-Churchill conference, whereas the advertised matter of the "second front" is one that is more likely to be decided by American and British military leaders on the single point of when they are ready.
