TENANTS STICK IN APARTMENT SIEGE

Seattle, June 25.—(P)—Handicapped slightly by a lack of heat but using neighbor's water taps and refrigerators, tenants of the La Manse apartments held out for the third day today against the orders of their landlord to evacuate because he feels rent ceilings are too low.

William Corbett, the landlord, held firm to his decision to close the apartments unless the government relaxes its maximum rent ceiling and tenants held just as firmly to their decision to stick it out.

"We'll fight it out on this line if it takes all summer," R. A. McMurtrie, spokesman for the tenants, declared last night.

Neighbors yesterday offered the use of their refrigerators for keeping perishable foodstuffs and continued to supply water to the apartments by means of hoses.

Big Bond Campaign Will Start July 1

New York, June 25.—(P)—A government-planned nationwide drive for the sale of war bonds, to be launched about July 1, will be "one of the most intensive ever imagined," Dr. Miller McClintock, managing director of the advertising council, declared today.

Dr. McClintock, who spoke at the convention of the American Federation of Advertisers, said the drive would concentrate chiefly on the plan to have all workers put 10 per cent of their salary into the purchase of bonds. He said newspapers, radio and every other form of advertising would be used.
