

Craters Boost Lead to Full Game With 11-2 Win Over Grants Pass

CRIPPEN PITCHES THREE-HIT GAME FOR 5TH VICTORY

Hurler Bats In Four Runs
With Three Hits—Locals
Pull Two Double Plays.

Medford stretched its Oregon-California league lead to a full game over the Klamath Falls Pelicans here last night as Steve Crisp pitched a three-hit game for his fifth victory against no defeats in pitching and batting the Craters to an 11-2 conquest of the hapless Grants Pass Merchants, who now have dropped 10 consecutive contests.

It was Medford's seventh straight league victory and ninth in a row counting the two Bear Photo games, and placed the Craters in an enviable position for their crucial two-game series against Klamath Falls at Klamath Falls Saturday night and Sunday afternoon.

Crippen turned up with one of his best mound jobs, holding the Merchants to three blows, fanning eight and allowing nary an earned run. And just to make certain of registering No. 5 win of the season he personally whaled four runs across the

plate with a triple and two singles in five trips.

Runs Unearned
The red-head held Grants Pass hitless for five frames, although the visitors picked up a run in the second on George Gitzsen's walk, steal of second, an infield out and Crippen's wild pitch. Their other run was also unearned, coming in the ninth when Clark walked, stole second and third and tallied on Johnny Gitzsen's error on Lathrop's grounder.

The Merchants threatened to score on two other occasions, but fast double plays squelched the fires. Singles by Paul (Hoosier) Hoffman and Laubach in the fifth put men on first and third, but Norm Worthley nabbed G. Gitzsen's smash and turned it into a twin killing to Lieber via J. Gitzsen. In the seventh, with the bases loaded by virtue of walks to Clayton and Hoffman and Laubach's double, Don Fawcett grabbed G. Gitzsen's stizzler, tagged third and rifled the pellet to first for a two-baby slaughter.

Bob Gehring, big righthander, started on the mound for the Merchants and gave seven hits and seven runs in six innings. Southpaw Rusty Martindale finished the game and yielded four runs on six blows.

The Craters got four runs in the third inning without benefit of a hit. Three walks, a hit batsman, two errors by Shortstop Clark and one by G. Gitzsen were responsible.

In the fifth the locals really went to work on Gehring. Catherwood doubled to left and Lieber doubled to right. Madden walked, and after J. Gitzsen forced Lieber at third Crippen hit a two-run single to left to make the score 7 to 1.

Lefty Hit Hard
Martindale, who took over in the seventh, was immediately bounced for two more Crater tallies. Madden singled to left,

Gitzsen went clear to second when Clayton booted his sacrifice bunt and Crippen drove them home with another single to left.

The Craters picked up their last two runs in the eighth on Lieber's single, Gitzsen's single and Swanson's blow to right.

Crippen was master of the situation at all times and one of the three hits he allowed was of the scratchiest variety. It was a pop fly to the infield that Swanson, Crippen and Fawcett let fall safely. At that, the Merchants should have had another blow when Gehring smashed one to the left field boards and pulled up at third, but the pitcher failed to touch first.

Al Wray Lightner celebrated his 23rd birthday with a single and double in four trips and a great running catch of Johnson's fly to short right-center in the eighth. The Crater center fielder received a nice birthday present, too, a \$5 bill for hitting the Flynn electric sign in left.

PASSEAU NOTCHES 11TH AS CHICAGO TIPS PHILS, 3-1

Those two hardy perennials, Claude Passeau and William (Lucky Bucky) Walters, are bidding strongly for the pitching leadership of the National league again.

Passeau pitched a four-hitter for the Chicago Cubs to beat the Philadelphia Phils, 3-1, and attain his 11th victory, the most games any pitcher in the major leagues has won.

Walters, like Passeau, hasn't had much help from his teammates, with Cincinnati ranking last in the league in both batting and fielding, yet last night he scored his eighth success against five setbacks by holding the New York Giants to six hits over 10 innings to lead the Reds to a 4-3 decision in a twilight tussle.

The Reds' triumph coincided with a double defeat for the St. Louis Cardinals to close the gap between second and third place to a single game.

The Redbirds were beaten 6-2 and 3-1 at Boston by the Braves yesterday as Jim Tobin and rookie Willard Donovan turned in two nice pitching jobs.

In the American league the New York Yankees captured their second straight decision over the St. Louis Browns, 6-4, with Joe DiMaggio, Charley Keller and Tom Henrich each getting two hits.

Broadway Charley Wagner came up with his second 1-0 victory in a row as the Boston Red Sox stopped the Detroit Tigers on his three-hit hurling.

Lefty Al Milnar organized a five-hit 9-0 shutout of the Philadelphia Athletics for the Cleveland Indians.

John Humphries shut out the Washington Senators, 6-0, for the Chicago White Sox.

**Favorites Fall As
Field Sliced To 16
In College Tourney**

South Bend, Ind., June 25.—(P)—Picking the next national intercollegiate golf champion is like playing the old blindfolded game of pinning on the donkey's tail.

The field was cut from 64 to 16 players yesterday and many of the favorites fell. Earl Stewart of Louisiana state, the defending champ, was virtually the only favorite left for today's 36-hole match play, which will shave the list to four semi-finalists.

Players to watch were such outsiders as Jim Teale of Minnesota, who shot an unofficial 67 in crushing the chances of Dick Haskell, the northwestern ex-caddy who qualified with a 142; Dale Mores, of L. S. U., who fired three birdies in a row to win his match; John Staltz and stylist Manuel de la Torre of Northwestern, and Midshipman David Paul of the U. S. naval academy.

Eleven schools were represented today with L. S. U., Yale, Northwestern, Stanford and Washington having two men in the running. Two of the day's best third round matches appeared to be between Stewart and John Holmstrom of Illinois, the outgoing president of the intercollegiate golf association; Ray Brownell of Stanford, last year's runner-up, and Harold Gjome of Washington.

Rangel, battling gamely, sought to exchange blow for blow, but was unable to match the tornado of punches unleashed by Armstrong, who once held three boxing titles at the same time.

A recent War Production Board order prohibits the production of all track-type tractors in the 17- to 35-h.p. class after September 1, 1942, and limits the production of these models until that date.

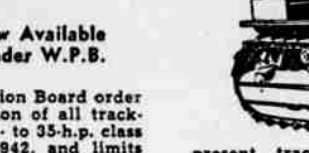
