

LOCAL SURVIVOR OF LEXINGTON TO RESUME SERVICE

Aviation Mechanic Bert Hughes of Rogue River, a survivor from the aircraft carrier Lexington which was sunk in the Coral sea battle early in May, left this morning for San Diego, Calif., after spending a furlough at the home of Frank E. Hall in Rogue River, with whom he had lived for several years prior to joining the navy three years ago.

Hughes declared that plane for plane and man for man the Japs were inferior to the Americans. However, he said, the Jap Zero fighter planes were more maneuverable than American fighter craft but added that United States planes were far superior in every other respect. "Jap flyers," he recalled, "seemed to have only one idea in mind—to crash their planes into their objects. But we usually got them before they could do it." He said the Japs were poor bombardiers and added that the only time they would engage Americans in air fights was when they had numerical superiority.

SEEDMEN'S CHIEF SAYS VETCH, PEAS STORY ERRONEOUS

Statements appearing in Oregon newspapers that seed dealers would receive a "total profit of \$18 a ton for hairy vetch seed" and \$16 a ton for Austrian peas" is entirely erroneous and not based on facts, says a statement issued from the office of Leon S. Jackson, manager of the Oregon Feed and Seed Dealers' association, received here today.

The statement says "the AAA sets the handling charges, and up to Saturday had not indicated what dealers would be paid for their work. Dealers have asked that they be allowed \$9 per ton for hairy vetch and \$8 for peas, just half of the amount credited in the statement sent out by a Washington, D. C. news service."

"Officials of the association have asked that this Washington news service correct the false impression conveyed in

this news release, as it has already created considerable disturbance to seed growers of the state. Many seed growers are aware of the fact that this information is not correct, but in view of the fact that the AAA has not yet set handling charges, others do not know but what the statement is correct.

"Seed dealers have worked closely with the AAA in an effort to secure top prices for the growers in their southern trade, built up over a period of years."

Douglas Co. Nickel Will Be Developed

Portland, June 25.—(P)—The state department of mineral industries and geology announced late today receipt of information that the Freeport Sulphur company was taking over the Nickel mountain nickel deposits in southern Douglas county for development.

The department said the company was one of the country's largest mining firms and that the move portended the first nickel mining in Oregon of any consequence.

The deposit has been known for many years but has never been developed.
