To Portland—Dr. Bert R. Elliott of the Medford Central building left yesterday for Portland where he will attend the clinics of the Oregon State Dental association.

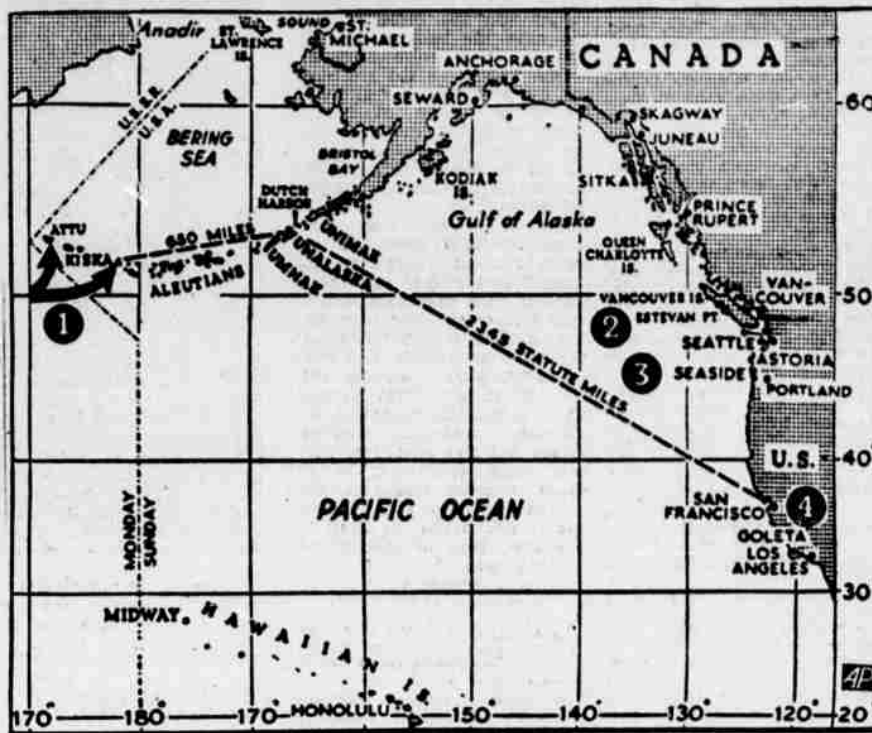

OPTIMISTIC WORD IN WAR COUNCIL

Washington, June 25.—(P)—Members of the Pacific War council and of the senate and house discussed war conditions and war plans today with President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill and, with complete unanimity, said they received definite impressions that there was reason for encouragement in the over-all situation.

This applied particularly to Egypt, they indicated.

Just what the reasons for this were could not be definitely ascertained, but Representative Martin of Massachusetts, the house minority leader, said the British prime minister had indicated that Egypt and the Suez Canal were not in too great danger.

BARTENDER FOR FLYNN'S PARTY HURT IN FRACAS

Hollywood, June 25.—(P)—James Fleming, 33, stand-in for Actor Errol Flynn, was booked in jail today on suspicion of assault with intent to do bodily harm as police undertook an investigation of a row at Flynn's home early last Sunday.

Capt. Vernon Rasmussen of the homicide squad said the condition of Eric Gosta, butler for Heiress Barbara Hutton, was such that "we may have a homicide case on our hands."

Gosta received a fractured skull in an incident in the Flynn kitchen. He had been hired to help tend bar at a birthday party for Flynn attended by such screen notables as Alexander Korda, Merle Oberon, Cary Grant, Tyrone Power and Charles Chaplin. Rasmussen said he intended to question the movie figures in an effort to learn what happened.

Fleming's own version was given in a formal statement to Detectives R. F. McGarry and J. R. Stevens.

"I hit him after he took a

swing at me," they quoted him as saying.

To reporters he displayed a mark under his left eye and declared:

"He hit me first. Then I socked him in the mouth. The blow wasn't hard enough to knock a man down. Gosta fell and I suppose hit his head on the concrete."

THEATRES BOND SALES GROWING

The Medford theatres' sale of war bonds and stamps continues to grow as the figures today accounted for more than \$3,200 in bonds and stamps sold during the past two weeks.

Because they are proud of the work they are doing the theatres have a bond barometer in the lobby of the Craterian theatre which will show to patrons and the public the steady growth of sales for all the theatres. The display is painted on the large lobby mirror in the Craterian's foyer and each day as the sales grow the red line of the barometer will shoot toward the ceiling. At the rate sales have come in the past two weeks it won't be long until it reaches the ceiling.

The four local theatres are the only theatres in the state and possibly the country that can take orders and fill them at the same time. This has been made possible by the Medford branch of the First National Bank of Portland. Showgoers and the public may leave their orders for bonds at any Medford theatre as they attend the show and pick it up as they leave. This service is maintained especially for those who work during bank and post office hours, however, many southern Oregonians are now buying their bonds "after hours" because of the convenience it affords.

The theatres will continue to give this service to the public as long as the demand continues for the bonds, which, of course, means for the duration.

George A. Hunt is particularly pleased with the acceptance the public has made of this medium of bond and stamp sales and has instructed his staffs in all four theatres to give full assistance to those wishing to purchase either bonds or stamps.
