

John and Coke Brito Seek Commutation of Murder Sentences

Sacramento, Calif., June 26.—(AP)—An appeal for commutation of sentence by two Siskiyou county killers will be reviewed by the state advisory pardon board at San Francisco Tuesday. It was announced today.

The applicants are John Brito, 42, and Coke Brito, 37, convicted December 22, 1936, on three counts each of first degree murder.

A Siskiyou county superior court jury found them guilty of killing Fred Seaborn and Deputy Sheriff Martin Lange and Joseph Clark on August 29, 1936.

Their death sentences were commuted to life imprisonment by Governor Culbert L. Olson May 9, 1939. They now seek commutation of sentence to time served.

John and Coke Brito are former residents of the Jacksonville district, where they engaged in mining and ranching for a number of years before their enrollment in the Siskiyou county slayings.

A Yankee housewife is going to have to learn how to prepare the collard greens, grits, hot biscuits and gravy that Johnny got to liking so much when he was stationed down in Dixie.

And many a Dixie cook is going to have to add beans, baked "Boston" style, and more potatoes to her menus because her soldier man developed a taste for them when he was stationed above up north.

This warning to the folks back home is being passed along by the army quartermaster corps. The quartermaster at Fort Benning, Ga., of course, is

more concerned about its experiences with the "Yankee" soldiers and southern food and is willing to prophesy that the eating habits of the entire nation may be revolutionized by the war.

The northern soldiers had a worse time getting acclimated to Dixie food than they did to the Dixie climate.

When a northern soldier saw a bowl of collard greens, he usually would decide it was spinach, take a bite and get a shock. That famous southern standby—grits—wasn't even a word in the northern soldier's vocabulary.

And so at first, he didn't like the food because it was different. But it's another story now, and the "Yankees" are calling for hot biscuits instead of white bread and steamed rice instead of potatoes.

And while the southern boys are getting used to northern food, midwesterners stationed along the seaboard are getting their first chance at oysters, crabs, lobsters and other sea foods.

So the quartermaster corps thinks it had better caution the home folks to start planning for the post-war period—by exchanging recipes.
