

Stanford and Washington Golfers in Intercollegiate Semi-Finals

HUSKY SKI CHAMP WINS TWO DUELS WITH SIX BIRDIES

Harold Gjølme To Face Stanford's Tatum While De La Torre Battles Kuntz.

South Bend, Ind., June 26.—(AP)—The National Intercollegiate golf tournament has simmered down to its most colorful semi-finals in a 45-year history.

With Earl Stewart of Louisiana state, the defending champ and Ray Brownell of Stanford, last year's runner up, upset yesterday, four comparative unknowns were free to romp over the chain o' lakes links in a wide open chase for the championship, which will be decided tomorrow in a 36-hole playoff.

The semi-finalists included: (1) Manuel De La Torre, Northwestern sophomore, born in Madrid, Spain, where his father, Angel De La Torre, now an assistant professional at a Chicago Club, was pro at the Royal Madrid Country Club.

(2) Harold Gjølme of the University of Washington, winner of the National Intercollegiate Skating championship two years ago and son of Reidar Gjølme of Norway, a renowned skiing champ back in the early 1900's.

(3) Frank Tatum, Jr., valedictorian of Stanford's senior class, who boasts of Scotch ancestry and who went out and organized golf exhibitions to get enough money so the Stanford team could come here.

(4) Bob Kuntz of Yale, former winner of the New York metropolitan junior title, and a very disappointed youngster when his older brother Bill was eliminated yesterday. He is of Swiss ancestry.

Kuntz was paired against De La Torre and Gjølme against Tatum today.

Gjølme, playing his last golf before entering the army air corps, ousted Ray Brownell in the morning yesterday, then beat Northwestern's John Stolz, 4 and 3 in the quarter finals. His card bristled with six birdies fashioned by brilliant putting and approaching. He went over par only once and posted a 66 by finishing out the round after his match was completed.

Gordon and 8 Other Yanks Picked For All-Star Team

Chicago, June 26.—(AP)—Plenty of seasoned American League campaigners and a new crop of Yankees await the National Leaguers July 6 at New York when they will renew their annual mid-season feud, the all star baseball classic.

Fourteen of the squad of 22 players announced yesterday by William Harridge, league president, were members of the 1941 winning combination, even to the leading principals—Edgar Smith of Chicago's White Sox, the winning pitcher, and Boston's Ted Williams, whose ninth inning homer brought the junior circuit its sixth triumph in nine games.

If veterans like these fall to respond, Joe McCarthy, who will manage the American leaguers, can call on his Yankees. A total of nine Yankees, including Joe Gordon, the league's top slugger, three other repeaters from 1941 and five newcomers, made the squad.

In fact, rival managers thought so much of Yankee talent that along with the veteran Bill Dickey they named New York's second string catcher, Buddy Rosar.

Rosar and teammates Phil Rizzuto, Tom Henrich, Ernie Bonham and Spurgeon Chandler also dominated the newcomers to the all star roster. The others were Pitchers C. C. Hugheson of Boston, Jim Bagby, Cleveland; Harold Newhouse, Detroit, and Stan Spence, Washington.

Detroit and Boston each landed four players on the squad, Cleveland three, Washington two, and Chicago, Philadelphia and St. Louis one apiece.

Dickinson, Crippen Slated To Pitch Week-End Tilts—Lieber Tops Hitters.

Dutch Lieber's Medford Craters make their first hop of the year to Klamath Falls this weekend for a two-game series that may or may not revise the Oregon-California league standings.

The Lieberites are currently leading the Pelicans by a full game, with eight wins and two losses to Klamath's seven and three. Only by nabbing both tilts can Ernie Bishop's crew move into first place. A split will maintain Medford's one-game lead, and a double win will put the Craters three big games out front.

Pvt. Joseph Dickinson of the U. S. army is slated to fling the Saturday night fray for the locals, with undefeated Steve Crippen or Lieber working the Sabbath contest. The army right-hander has one loop win and no defeats to his credit, Crippen has a five and zero record.

Klamath's hurling chores will probably be divided by Virgil Haynes, who lost his first start to Dorris last week-end, 5 to 4, and Kenny Benham, ace of the Whitman college mound staff who managed to whip Dorris in the same series, 15 to 14, although yielding a dozen blows.

In the other week-end series, the third-place Dorris Lumberjacks will move to Grants Pass for a Sunday afternoon double-header. Clyde Carlstrom and Jim Snyder will pitch for Dorris, Gehring and Martindale for the Merchants.

COOPER NOTCHES 10TH VICTORY BY BLANKING BRAVES

The success story of the year in baseball concerns Morton Cecil Cooper of the St. Louis Cardinals, who is most likely to be the National league's starting pitcher in the all-Star game in New York July 6.

Cooper captured his tenth victory and sixth shutout yesterday 4-0 with a stunning two-hit performance against the Boston Braves in an Army-Navy Relief game that raised more than \$28,500 from 25,000 fans at Boston.

It was only the third victory in the last 10 games for St. Louis and Cooper on all three with shutouts—stretching a skein of 32 consecutive scoreless innings.

The Brooklyn Dodgers bashed the Cincinnati Reds 4-0 in a twilight game by rallying for five successive hits after two were out in the third stanza. Peeewe Reese, Lew Riggs, Pete Reiser and Joe Medwick hit singles for two runs, with Medwick's blow extending his hitting streak to 27 games. Then Dolph Camilli doubled two more tallies across and routed 36-year-old Ray Starr, who had won 10 games and lost only two previously.

Big Bill Lee also pitched five-hit ball as the Chicago Cubs cuffed the Phils 7-1 to sweep their three-game series at Philadelphia.

In the American league the Chicago White Sox shut out the Washington Senators for the second straight game 2-0 in a spectacular hurling duel between Lee (Buck) Ross and Sid Hudson. The Washington right-hander allowed just five hits, one less than his teammates made off Ross, but Chicago wasted only one hit.

Lefty Al Smith of the Cleveland Indians achieved his fourth straight triumph with a five-hit pitching job that stopped the Philadelphia Athletics 4-1.

Detroit downed the Boston Red Sox 7-3 with a six-run rally in the eighth inning sparked by Jim Bloodworth's two-run homer.

The inaugural handicap at six furlongs tomorrow and the Tacoma handicap of one mile Sunday are high spots on the cards of the two opening days.

Despite wartime changes, the big plant 11 miles south of here in the fertile Duwamish River Valley was all set to go today with 530 horses on hand from racing centers all over the west. By July 8, stalls will be needed for 225 more horses being shipped west from the Omaha meet and for 100 or more from the Los Angeles meet.
