Rease Braley, who heads the home hospitality committee and her members, suggest that these ideas be clipped and saved for future reference.

Here are a few of the dislikes: Over-organization, institutional atmosphere; straight rows of chairs, bright overhead lights, old magazines, be forced to play games on arrival; patronizing people, talking women; war talk, shop talk; people who ask too many personal questions or pry into their background; people who fuss over them like a mother hen over chicks; girls who babble on and

P. duty after the party; stiff formal programs, to be bossed, to be forced to perform when they don't want to do so, to be embarrassed or be made the goat of a game or activity, songs that make them homesick, patriotic songs, people who favor one group or regiment or type of soldier and neglect others, leaders who blow whistles, too many service men present; civilians present who take the girls out of circulation.

CHEMIST INVENTS LIQUID TO FIGHT INCENDIARY BOMB

Formula Turned Over To
United Nations — Fire-
Fighting Experts Pleased.

Los Angeles (U.P.)—A liquid that may rob the incendiary bomb of its menace to life and property was recently turned over to the United Nations by a Los Angeles chemist.

Recent tests conducted in the suburbs of Los Angeles indicate that the new substance, deoxolin, effectively flameproofs and also extinguishes fires attacking clothing, wooden roofs, gasoline tanks and metal objects.

The inventor, Dr. O. T. Hodenfield, a native of Norway, declined to discuss his discovery until recently when it was found that the deoxolin formula cannot be broken down successfully by enemies of the democracies.

Dr. Hodenfield announced that the liquid is now being manufactured in large scale quantities and initial shipments have been made to Allied army and navy posts. He said the formula for deoxolin was given to the governments of the United Nations "under certain conditions that preclude commercialization by civilians."

Fire-fighting experts who witnessed the recent experimental tests of deoxolin concluded that the liquid is the first reliable method of controlling the type which caused such extensive damage in London.

As a demonstration, Dr. Hodenfield threw a few hand grenades at a carpet. Magnesium shavings and thermite powder were ignited creating a heat of 3,500 degrees F., and raked onto the treated sawdust. Half an hour later the "bomb" had melted and was extinguished gradually by the action of the deoxolin—and the

carpet was not even damaged. A man dressed in a deoxolin-treated overall suit emerged unscathed from a fire made of burning straw, and a metal box made of the type of material that go into a modern warplane was not even charred by burning oil after it was treated with the new substance.

Dr. Hodenfield said any burning area sprayed with deoxolin from a standard nozzle will be extinguished in from three to five minutes.

HIGHWAY BUILDING OUT FOR DURATION SAYS COMMISSION

Portland, June 26 (U.P.)—From where the state highway commission sat today—in its meeting room in the Public Service building—road construction in Oregon is approaching extinction for the duration.

Nine projects were listed but only six drew bids and the low bids were high enough to increase the blood pressure of the commission.

Commissioners said they thought that after cantonment work and other war projects had been finished, contractors with idle equipment might accept highway work at figures within engineering estimates—but they admitted it hasn't happened yet.

Highway Engineer R. H. Baldoock told the board gasoline revenues were down 10 per cent from the relative period of last

year, estimated license fees in 1943 would drop to \$2,875,000 in 1943 compared with \$3,167,635 this year, and to \$2,398,000 in 1944. Gasoline tax estimates were off far more. The 1941 yield was \$12,868,344, the 1942 estimate was \$11,328,833, the 1943 guess \$8,137,972 and the 1944 estimate \$4,629,319.

Truck revenues under utility commission permits are expected to slump from the high of \$1,297,786 in 1941 to \$830,583 in 1944.

All of which does not forecast much money for new road construction, the commission pointed out.

PETER PIPER PUNCH

Combine 3 cups orange carbonated beverage, 2 cups ginger ale, and 2 cups grape juice. Chill thoroughly. Just before serving add thinly sliced orange slices and maraschino cherries. Pour into punch bowl over cake of ice. Serves 8 to 10.

CITRUS FLOAT

Mix lemon juice and sugar, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Pour water over tea in heated container; cover, steep five minutes; pour tea immediately from leaves. Cool. Add tea to lemon juice and sugar. Just before serving add ginger ale. Pour into tall glasses over crushed ice or ice cubes. Top with orange ice and serve at once. Serves 8.

PEPPERMINT ALE FIZZ

Put candy through food chopper, using coarse knife. Whip cream until stiff. Fold candy into cream. Pour into automatic refrigerator tray. Place in freezing unit. Set control at coldest point and freeze until mixture is firm. Place serving of peppermint cream in tall glass. Fill glass with ginger ale. Mix well. Serves 6.

COFFEE COOLER

Fill tall glasses ¾ with crushed ice and a scoop of ice cream. Pour in freshly-made, hot double-strength coffee.

RASPBERRY FLIP

Make 4 cups strong tea; chill. Combine No. 1 can (or 2 cups fresh crushed) raspberries with ¼ cup sugar; boil 5 minutes; strain. Chill. Combine tea, raspberry syrup, ¼ cup lemon juice, and 2 cups orange juice or orange soda beverage. Pour into tall glasses over crushed ice or ice cubes. Serves 6 to 8.

GRAPE JUICE

Because it is naturally sweet, grape juice is a special boon during this sugar-conscious period. Combine it with carbonated water, ginger ale, lemon, grapefruit, orange or pineapple juice; or dilute it to taste with ice water.

TROPICAL PUNCH

Whip ¼ cup mashed ripe banana until creamy; combine with 1 ¼ cups cold milk; add 1 tbsp. pineapple juice; pour into a tall glass; top with a dash of nutmeg and garnish with a stick of cinnamon. Makes one 10-oz. serving.

What to substitute for sugar in muffins and fruit pies

You can use any of the substitutes for sugar in making muffins, maple flavored or corn syrup, honey, molasses (light or dark), sorghum and brown or maple sugar—in the same amounts as the amount of granulated sugar called for in your favorite recipe. Mix the liquid type sweeteners with liquid ingredients, and proceed as usual. Baking temperatures remain the same.

Note: Dried fruits or chopped nut meats combine well with the flavors of sugar substitutes in muffins; they also add nutrition and dried fruits add sweetening.

In fruit pies, maple flavored syrup or corn syrup can be used this way: In place of 1 cup granulated sugar, use ¼ cup syrup plus ¼ cup granulated sugar. Mix with prepared fruit before putting it in pie shell (to distribute sweetening evenly and to prevent soaking of the pastry). Baking temperatures remain the same.

When you use brown or maple sugar, honey or molasses (light or dark): Use an equal amount of substitute in place of the granulated sugar called for and proceed as outlined above.

To sweeten fresh or cooked fruits, use any of the sugar substitutes according to your taste.

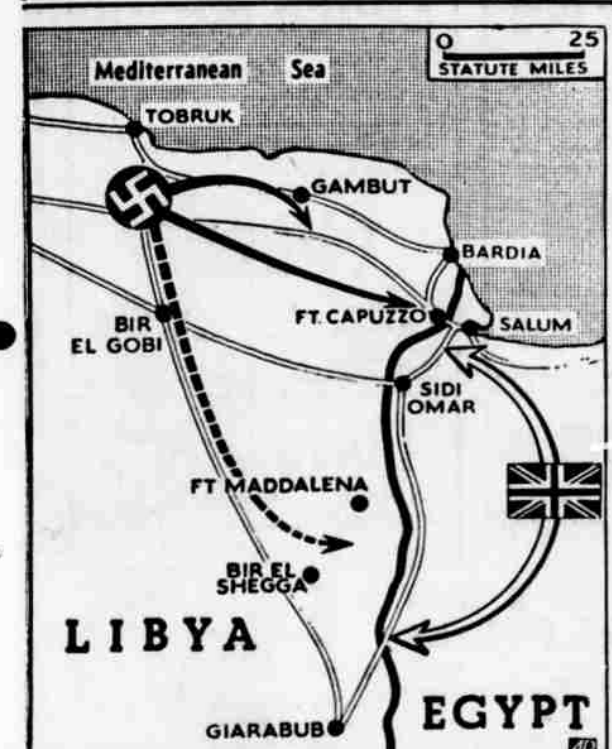
