MEXICAN TANKERS U-BOAT VICTIMS EX-ITALY SHIPS

Tampico, Mexico, June 27—(AP)—Two Mexican tankers, former Italian vessels which were taken over after they sought refuge in Mexican harbors, were torpedoed and sunk within two hours today 50 miles off the Mexican coast while on coastwise voyages.

This important oil port was ordered blacked out and war measures were imposed.

A squadron of planes and a patrol ship immediately went in search of the submarines, the announcement said.

One vessel was the government tanker Tuxpan, the former 7,000-ton Italian tanker Americano, which was taken over by Mexico after she sought refuge in the harbor of Tampico when Italy entered the war.

She was sent down off Isla Lobos, about 85 miles south of Tampico.

The second ship was the Chapas, the former Italian tanker Atlas.

TOYKO AIR RAID SOON VETS TOLD

Asbury Park, N. J., June 27 (AP)—The army plans a major air raid on Tokyo soon, a navy officer told the annual encampment of the New Jersey department, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Ensign Richard McShane Kelly said last night that an aide of Brig. Gen. James H. Doolittle, leader of the April 18 bombing raid on Japanese cities, had told him of the army's intentions.

"The Japs will think the last one was a tea party," said Kelly. "We will have more bombs and more planes."

"If the united nations lose China and Russia," he commented, "the invasion of America and the British Isles will not only be probable but inevitable."

AMERICAN PLANES AT SECRET BASE FOR MASS DRIVE

London, June 27—(AP)—A large vanguard of the United States army air corps is established in the British Isles and is making preparations at a secret base to bomb Germany soon in mass attacks coordinated with those of the Royal Air Force.

This was learned today from reliable informants who declined to identify themselves for quotation. How far the preparations have advanced and the actual size of American aerial units were military secrets, but authoritative sources said the men were already deployed to join the great assaults such as those on Bremen, Cologne, Essen, Rostock, Luebeck and other German industrial or shipping centers.

It was not disclosed whether a sufficient number of planes had been amassed for an all-American striking force, but as long ago as April 21 it was announced that bombers for use of United States airmen in wing to wing attacks with the RAF were being ferried across the Atlantic.

HONORED FLIERS GIVE DETAILS OF TOKYO'S BOMBING

Fort Greely, Kodiak, Alaska (AP)—Kodiak island, hitherto considered just a rocky, wet home for bear and salmon, has agricultural plans this year. Lt. Eugene L. Russell, graduate of the Oregon State College of Agriculture, is thumbing through seed catalogs these days for rugged strains of vitamin-packed vegetables and small fruits.

Gen. Charles H. Corlett decided that Fort Greely should become self-sustaining in green stuffs, and he selected Lieut. Russell to start production. Chief problem with the Kodiak soil is the heavy volcanic ash deposit, which came sitting down from the tremendous Mt. Katmai eruption in 1912.

Two Kodiak islanders have reported success in raising lettuce, cauliflower, peas, beans, and potatoes. They have been using scraped land, however, from which volcanic ash has been removed by laborious toil.

Such a process for the proposed 10-acre experiment plot at Fort Greely would be impractical, so Lieut. Russell will try to "sweeten" the ash with fertilizers and legume cover crops. "A large percentage of our plants will have to be raised in hotbeds and then set out when the sunlight season arrives," reports Russell.

Uncle Sam is making the best of a tough nutritional job on Kodiak island. Every bit of food, with the exception of experimental radish, cabbage, and potato supplies, must be brought in by boat.

WORKERS TRAINED WITH MOVIES IN BRIGGS COMPANY

Booklets, Slide Films Also Used To Aid Workers In Vital War Positions.

Detroit.—(UP)—The Briggs Manufacturing Company, builder of automobile bodies in peacetime, is relying heavily on motion pictures, slide films and generously illustrated booklets to help convert its manpower to war production jobs.

With more than \$375,000,000 worth of orders for aircraft and tank parts, Briggs will require 38,000 men and women at peak war output, an increase of 50 per cent over its peacetime payroll. It has seven plants in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana.

Approximately 20,000 men, most of them former auto body workers and supervisory employees, will be trained in the Briggs aircraft school, according to Henry J. Roesch, in charge of personnel. The firm already is in volume production on air-frame sections.

Waste Is Villain
One teacher with a major role in the training program is "Danny Defense," a ubiquitous little man with an overseas cap. "Danny" shows himself on virtually every film and every page of the printed booklets. He teaches workers "the easy way, the right way" to weld rivet and drill. His three-point program is: "know your job, follow instructions and keep your mind and eyes on the job."

"A pilot is depending on the quality of the work you do today," he tells novices time and again.

One of Danny's most effective contributions is dramatizing the story of waste—waste of critical materials such as aluminum. Waste is pictured as the "villain" of the film and "Danny" tells the workers that, in the last analysis, "you fellows have to foot the bill for that waste."

Aluminum Is Soft
"Your tax money is paying for defense production," "Danny" emphasizes. "If you increase the cost, you're taking money right out of your own pocket. So don't you think it's about time we did something about this enemy, 'waste'?"

Briggs impresses upon its workers that by taking an active interest in the slide-films and motion pictures and by studying the booklets they will be able to learn details about their jobs which took others many "long, hard years."

Auto workers, accustomed to working with steel, need careful instruction before they are able to handle softer metals such as aluminum. A small dent or scratch on the frame of an auto body does not affect the strength of the part; a similar scratch on a piece of soft aluminum in aircraft production will make the piece useless.

No matter how skilled they may be workers are told they will be more valuable in aircraft production if they know how to "handle and protect vital materials."

M'NARY IN FAVOR OF COUNTY FAIRS

Washington, June 27—(AP)—It would be a mistake to erase county fairs for the war's duration, Senator McNary, long noted for his efforts on behalf of agriculture, declared today. He wrote Herman H. Childgren, president of the Oregon fairs association that defense transportation Director Joseph B. Eastman had no authority over fairs.

Eastman had asked deferment of fairs as a means of saving tires and eliminating unnecessary traveling. "If use of gasoline and rubber need be deferred," Senator McNary said, "the rule of deferment should first be applied to the great race tracks and ball parks in the east which attract more people to one event than the county fairs in a dozen western states."

USO CAMPAIGN IN COUNTY GROWING

The United Service Organization drive is meeting fine response in Jackson county according to John Moffet, permanent USO drive chairman for the county. He stated yesterday that the residents are "pleased to give" to the campaign and among the many solicitations made only a few have been refusals.

The drive, which comes to a close July 1, is part of a national campaign to raise funds for recreational purposes of men in the armed forces of America. Quota set for Jackson county is \$7,000 and Ashland has completed its portion of the drive. Women who would care to volunteer their service as solicitors are urged to contact USO representatives at the chamber of commerce.
