

3-RING CIRCUS HERE TODAY FOR TWO BIG SHOWS

Carrying all the traditional thrills of Circus day, the Russell Bros. 3-ring circus, one of America's largest, moved into Medford from Mount Shasta at the crack of dawn this morning and with no perplexing delays erected an entertainment city of gleaming white canvas near the Jackson school for two performances today at 2 and 8 p. m.

The scores of men, women and children who assembled on the lot this morning to watch the ever-alluring spectacle of erecting the tented city, witnessed a free show which to many is as interesting as the actual circus performance.

The big top, one of the largest spreads of canvas on the road, soon nosed into the air and by noon everything was in readiness for the afternoon performance. Doors to the menagerie will be opened again at 7 o'clock tonight giving Medford circus fans an entire hour to see all the animals before the start of the big show.

It was close to 7:30 p. m. when Sacramento and Seattle finished five hours and 22 minutes (playing time) of Coast League baseball. The shadows were long, the fans hungry, the players staggering.

But to a pair of righthanded pitchers and their employers, the extended effort seemed eminently worthwhile. For Clarence Beers his two hours and 20 minutes' work meant a 9-3 Sacramento victory over Seattle. For Blix Donnelly, his three hours and two minutes' toll was rewarded with a 3 to 1 decision over the same club.

Beers, in action for nine innings, gave up eight hits. But none was good for more than one base, and only two came in the last five innings, during which Seattle went scoreless after establishing an early 3-2 lead. Dick Barrett, driver to cover in the sixth, was the loser.

The double victory gave Sacramento the series, but even so the Senators lost ground for the week to the second-place Los Angeles Angels, who, likewise were double winners yesterday, finished with a 5-2 record against Hollywood.

The Sunday opener in the South was as hair-raising as its

11-10 score would indicate. Big Paul Gerhman, the league's leading pitcher in percentages, made the 8-0 afterpiece a very different kind of show, allowing only four singles.

A split yesterday with San Diego assured Portland an even 3-3 series division. Al Olsen of San Diego out-pitched Forrest Orrell, six hits to eight in the 2-1 opener, in which Mel Mazzera's homer proved a decisive blow. Syd Cohen blanked the Padres, 2-0, on three hits in the seventh inning nightcap. Portland got only five safeties off Frank Dasso, but four came in the sixth inning for both runs.

San Francisco swept its twin bill with Oakland, 8-2 and 3-0. Scores: San Diego 2 8 2, Portland 1 6 1, Olsen and Salkeld; Orrell and Mayer.
