

STORES TO SELL BONDS, STAMPS IN 15-MINUTE DRIVE

W. A. Gates, chairman of the county bond sales committee, said today that retailers are being asked to cooperate in a nationwide tribute to America's war effort July 1 at 12 noon by suspending all sales of merchandise for 15 minutes and devoting this period to sale of war stamps.

It is expected that over a million stores throughout the nation will participate in this effort. Proclamations are being issued by the governors of all states asking support of the public.

Benjamin H. Namm, chairman of the retail advisory committee was wired by the local committee that Medford retailers are "all-out" for this noon time sale of war stamps.

The Women's Volunteer Bond Sales Corps sold \$1,225 worth of bonds and \$1.25 stamps at the Victory booth located on Main street between Central avenue and Front street Saturday evening in less than two hours. Mrs. Ted Hornecker, chairman of the corps announced today.

DR. H. P. HARGRAVES FUNERAL TUESDAY IN CONGER CHAPEL

Dr. Henry P. Hargrave who passed away at his home, 38 North Orange st., Saturday morning after an illness of the past three years, was born at Woodstock, Ontario, Canada, July 20, 1874. At an early age, he moved with his family to Winnipeg where in 1895 he graduated in medicine from the university of Manitoba. After receiving his degree, he went to San Francisco where he continued his studies at Cooper medical college.

He then took up the practice of medicine in Phoenix, Oregon, in 1897 and in 1903 moved to Medford where he continued his practice until 1920. At that time he went to Berkeley, Calif., where he resided until returning to Medford in 1933.

During Dr. Hargrave's early career, he was health officer for Jackson county and was active in city affairs having served on the Medford city council for eight years.

Fraternally, he was a member of Medford lodge A. F. & A. M. Woodmen of the World and Modern Woodmen of America. Besides his wife, Maude Hargrave of Medford, he leaves one daughter, Gertrude Piper of San Diego, Calif.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Conger chapel at 2:30 Tuesday by the Rev. Louis C. Kirby. The remains will later be cremated.

FOREST RULES ON FIRE PREVENTION EFFECTIVE JULY 1

Effective July 1 are three regulations designed to reduce the dangers of fires in our national forests. It was announced today at headquarters of the Rogue River National Forest.

One requires a camp fire permit in all areas except on improved and posted campgrounds, the permits being available at forest service headquarters in the federal building or from any ranger or guard station.

Another prohibits smoking while traveling on dirt roads in all forested areas. This is a federal and state law, but doesn't apply to travel on pavement.

The third requires all persons obtaining a camp fire permit to carry with them an axe, shovel and water bucket in order to control the fire and completely

extinguish it when leaving. Unless serious weather conditions develop this week, there will be no closure of any portions of the Rogue River National Forest until after the Fourth of July, headquarters announced.

SELECT JURY FOR AUTO CRASH TRIAL

Trial of the damage suit of Stephen Cline, federal agency clerk, against the Pacific Greyhound Stages, for \$30,000 general damages and \$15,000 special damages began in circuit court today with selection of a jury.

The suit is based upon a collision last July 14, between an auto driven by Cline and a Greyhound stage, on the Pacific highway near the Beall Lane intersection. Nine passengers on the stage suffered minor injuries. Cline was in the hospital a few weeks as the result of injuries.

The defendant is represented by Greyhound lines counsel from Portland; the plaintiff by

Attorney Otto Frohnmayer and Don R. Newbury.
