Salem, July 1.—(P)—Governor Sprague ordered federal forests and private lands within forest service protection areas in Oregon closed yesterday to entry except by permit.

Federal officials, who requested the order, said campers could stop without permit only at designated recreational centers.

Shipyard Workers Leaving Portland

Portland, July 1.—(P)—The Oregon Building Congress complained yesterday that needed shipyard workers were leaving the city because they were unable to find housing. The congress said 3,800 workers left in May.

The Portland housing authority said priority difficulties had halted work on a 2,000-unit apartment project and threatened to halt work on 3,500 dwelling units.

LAWN PICNIC

Kidney Beans and Spareribs
Coleslaw with Diced Apple and Green Pepper
Buttered Rye Bread
Ice Cream and Cake
Coffee or Root Beer

KIDNEY BEANS WITH SPARERIBS

1 1/2 lbs. spareribs cut in 2-rib pieces
1 cup shortening
1 cup finely chopped onion
1/2 cup finely chopped garlic
1 1/2 cups meat stock
2 cups finely chopped carrots
1 cup soybeans
2 cups cooked kidney beans

Brown spareribs in hot shortening in heavy frying pan. Add onion and garlic; cook about 3 minutes, stirring frequently. Place spareribs in casserole. Combine meat stock (or 2 bouillon cubes dissolved in 1 1/2 cups boiling water), seasonings, and beans; pour over spareribs; cover. Bake in slow oven (325° F.) about 1 hour or until spareribs are tender. Serves 6. (Double recipe serves 12.)
