CRASH SUIT END SEEN TOMORROW

Trial of the damage suit of Stephen J. Cline against the Pacific Greyhound Stages for \$30,000, now in its fourth day in circuit court is expected to be concluded tomorrow.

Dr. Edwin R. Durno testified this morning for the defendants, and said Cline, following an examination showed he had made "a satisfactory recovery," considering the extent of his injuries. Medical testimony will be introduced by both sides.

The suit is based on a crash a year ago between an auto driven by Cline and a Pacific Greyhound stage on the Pacific highway near Beall Lane. Nine passengers on the stage were hurt.

LIEUTENANT ELDEN REPORTED MISSING

Word has been received here that Lieutenant Ralph Waldo Elden, 35, United States naval officer for more than 10 years has been reported missing following action in the performance of his duty. Lieut. Elden is the son of Mrs. Leila K. Elden, of Portland, former Central Point resident.

Lieut. Elden received an appointment to the naval academy at Annapolis, through Senator Charles L. McNary in 1927, graduating with the class of 1931. His father, Ralph Waldo Elden died a number of years ago. Lieut. Elden's wife and son reside in Chicago, Ill., and his sister, Mrs. Henry Dickinson, lives in South Pasadena, Cal.

8,490 MOTORISTS BUY \$5 STAMPS

At the close of business yesterday afternoon, 8,490 motorists had purchased their \$5 federal use tax stamps at Medford postoffice, it was announced today by Postmaster Frank DeSouza. The stamps are good for the 1942-43 fiscal year ending June 30, 1943, and must be on all vehicles in operation.

The postmaster said many motorists had obtained their stamps prior to the deadline Wednesday, July 1 in order to avoid the last-minute rush. He added that some vehicle-owners were still buying their stamps today.

Value of the stamps sold up to this morning was \$44,500, DeSouza stated.

BURNING PERMITS WILL END MONDAY

No permits for burning in the city limits will be issued by the fire department beginning Monday. Fire Chief Roy Elliott stated today. He said that residents were being asked to protect their property by trimming of weeds and grass from the buildings.

Because the outlook for fire is "very dangerous" the forest office also is issuing no fire permits outside the city limits. Elliott stated however, that small amounts of trash may be burned if the owner extinguishes the fire thoroughly before night. Permission for burning of small trash piles may be secured by telephoning the fire department, only a verbal permit being needed.

MAYFIELD, RUPP TRANSPORT AIDES

A. S. V. Carpenter, chairman of the war transportation committee in Jackson county announced today the appointment of L. B. Mayfield, senior high school principal and Lloyd Rupp, head of the plasterers' union in this city, as members of his committee.

Carpenter explained that duties of the committee included saving of rubber, by reduction of speed, walking where possible and doubling up on passengers in automobiles. He said that the campaign to help was being organized immediately in the county. New members will be added to the committee as needed.

1,058 REGISTERED FOR WAR SERVICE
